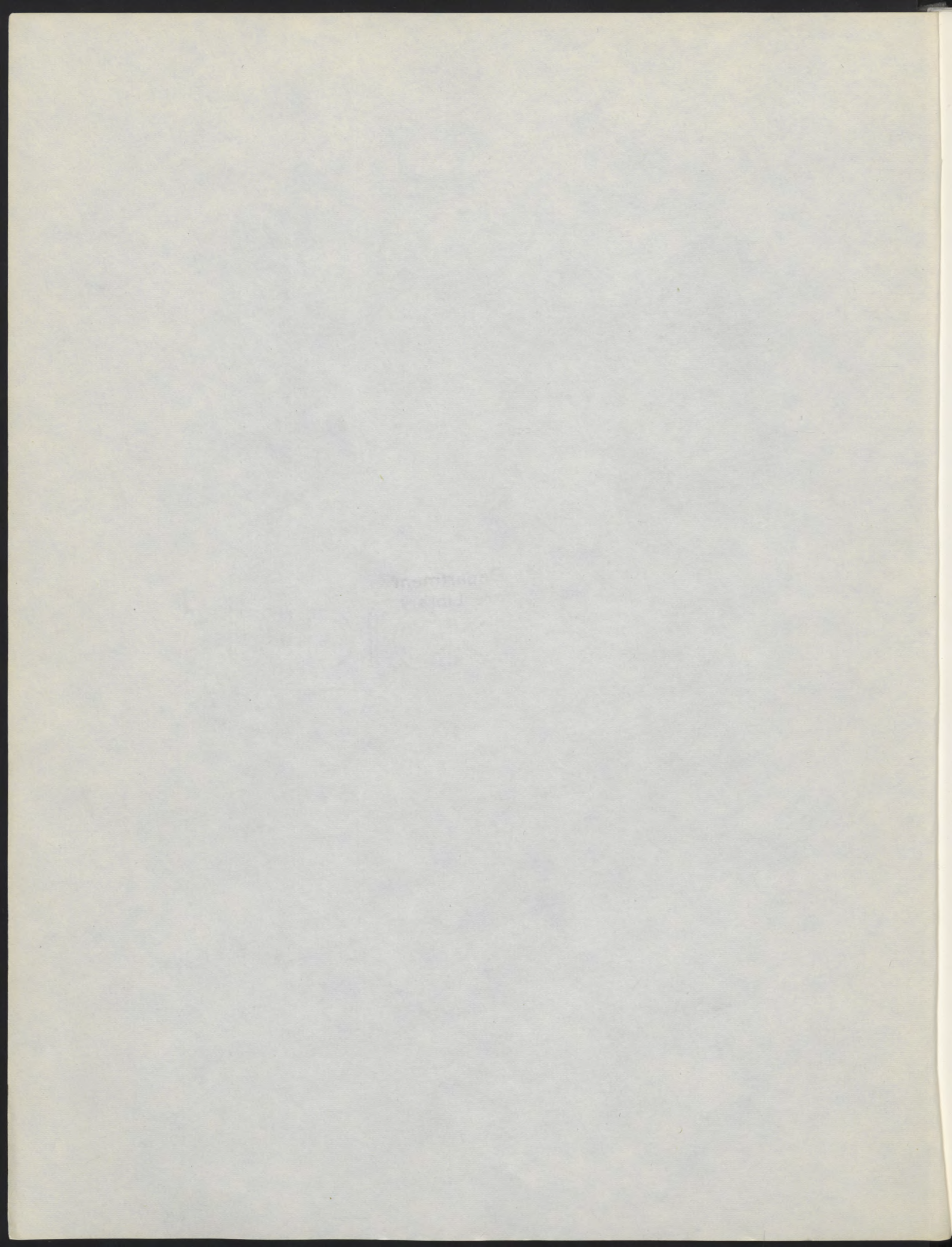

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## SUMMARY STATEMENT

Colorado was an average state nationally as far as average assistance payments were concerned for Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to the Blind, Aid to the Needy Disabled, and General Assistance. Only for the Old Age Pension did Colorado not only exceed the average but also was the highest in the nation with an average payment of \$95.26 per pension recipient. See Chart 2, Page 6.

In Chart 1, the composition of the overall total caseload is shown to be 76 per cent Old Age Pension. There was no appreciable change in composition from last year; however, Aid to the Needy Disabled increased from 6.97 to 7.13 per cent of the caseload and tends to continue to increase.

County departments had a total of 6,048 informal applications (inquiries) for assistance during the year to process; only 28 per cent became formal signed applications, 68 per cent were denied or withdrawn, and 4 per cent were pending. For the same period, counties had a total of 26,151 signed applications. Of this number, 78 per cent were approved, 16 per cent were denied, and 6 per cent were pending. Primary weeding out of ineligible applicants seemingly is done by county departments when persons first call to inquire about public assistance.

Cost of administering the public welfare program in Colorado during 1956 was 4.8 per cent of the total \$78,074,645.36 expended. This is very favorable when compared with other states. On a per case cost the most expensive public assistance program to administer was Aid to the Blind Treatment while the most inexpensive was the Pension. See Table 3, on page 18. Total administration costs were \$3,803,164.40. The cost for 1955 was \$3,543,275.57. This was a 7.3 per cent increase in the amount of money spent during 1956; nevertheless, the per cent of administrative cost in relation to the total welfare expenditures increased only one-tenth of one per cent above last year when it was 4.7 per cent.

Expenditures for "money" payments to recipients or to vendors in behalf of recipients totaled \$74,271,048.96. Of this sum \$26,829,316.57 was paid with Federal funds. This was 36.12 per cent of the total. The state paid 54.81 per cent while county departments paid 9.07 per cent, approximately what it was last year.



*To maintain staff in the county departments, the Colorado Merit System for county employees held three examinations during the year and 718 names were placed on the registers out of a total of 1,716 applicants. Many were screened out on the basis of requirements for the positions. Others failed to pass or were not available for employment. The Merit System operated at a cost of \$23,766.94 for the calendar year.*

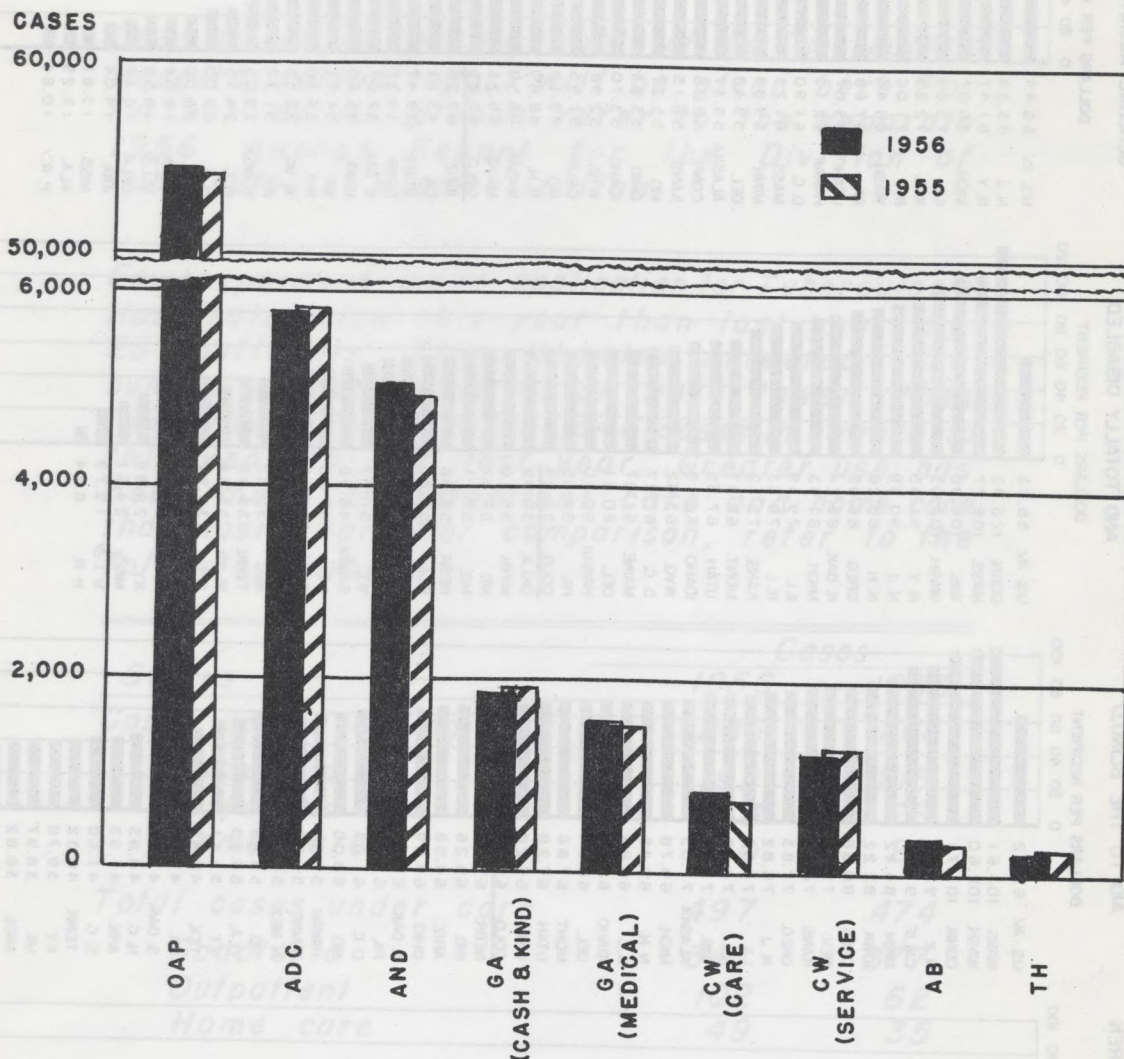
*Services given by the State Department included the supervision of medical care for tubercular patients while hospitalized in sanatoria. This supervision is under the State Director of Tuberculosis Hospitalization, who is a medical doctor who has specialized in the care and treatment of the disease. Medical social work services were also given by state staff. County department staff render direct services to their cases except those in tubercular sanatoria under state supervision. Four hundred and ninety-seven patients were served during the year by the Tuberculosis Hospitalization Division.*

*Services for the Blind are provided directly to the blind by four home teachers who served 384 blind persons during the year. They taught the reading and writing of Braille, handcrafts, typing, and how to get around, even to keeping house, i.e., cooking, etc.*

*Most other services including case work are provided by county departments with supervision by the Field Supervisors and Child Welfare Supervisors. Specialists on the State staff give community assistance, such as organization of recreation projects or other desired welfare activities. They give close supervision over adoptions and other functions. These state services augment the county department efforts to help people and communities to help achieve desirable improvements in living.*

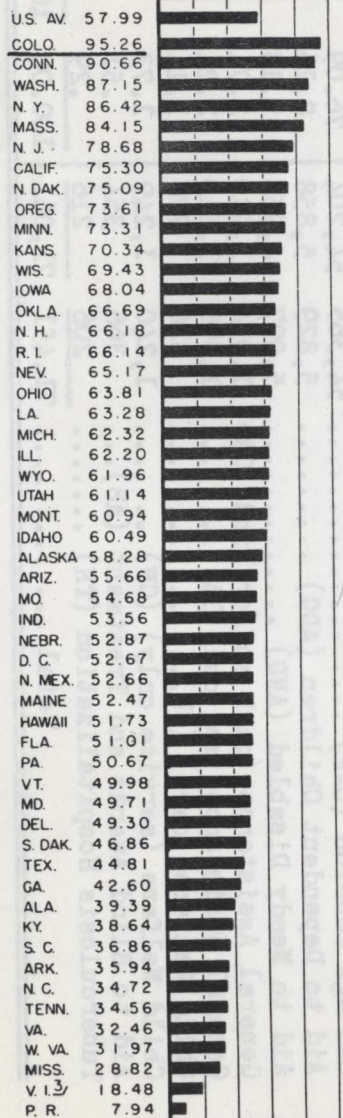
## PUBLIC ASSISTANCE: AVERAGE MONTHLY PAYMENT, DECEMBER 1956

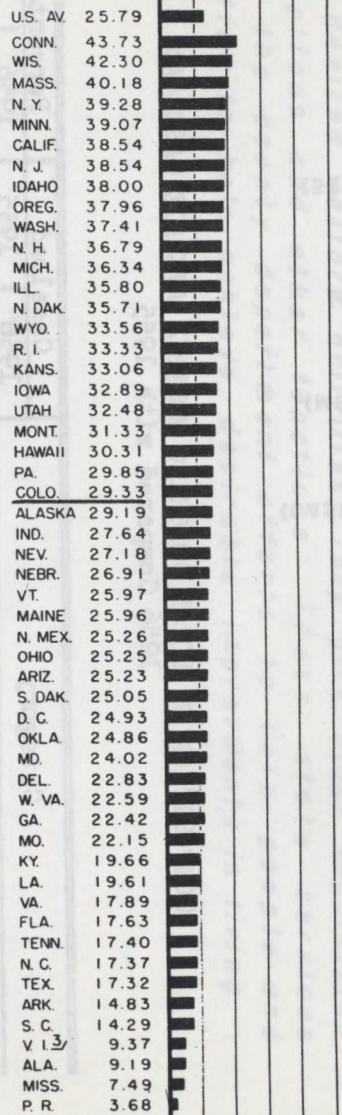

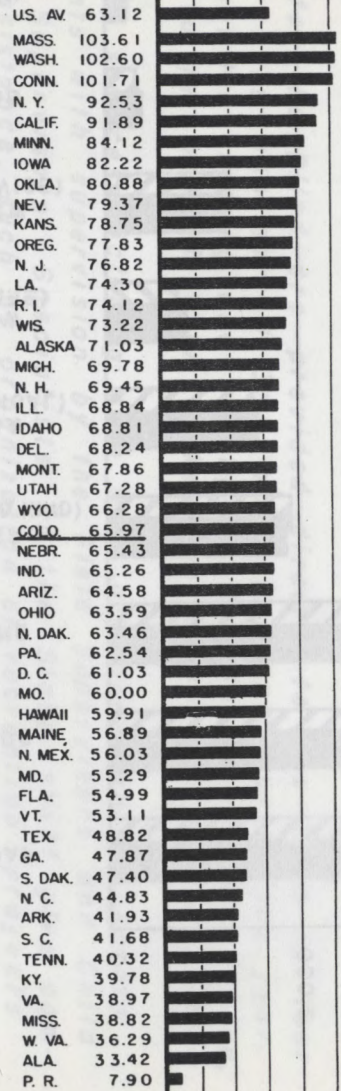

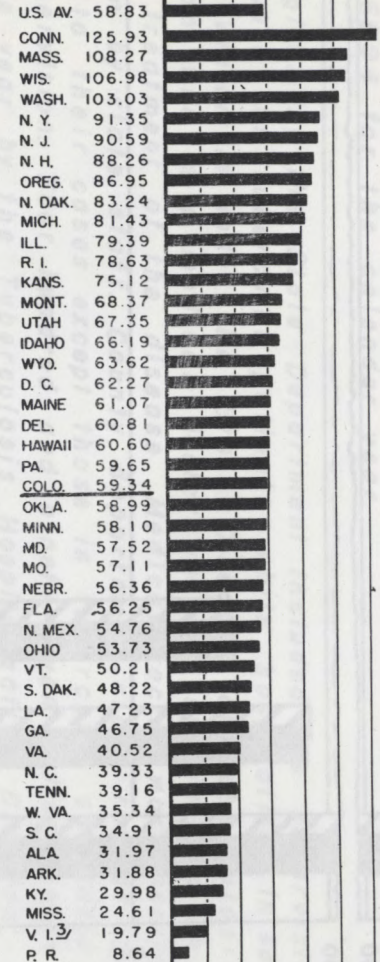

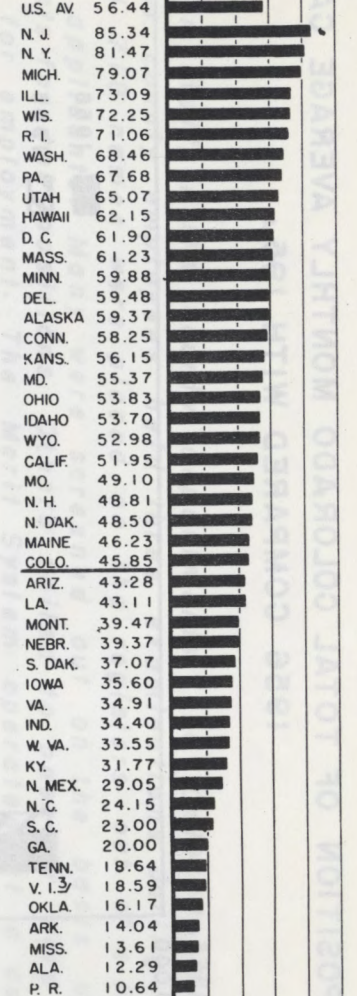

## TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITALIZATION

Only a few of the highlights of the Tuberculosis Hospitalization report will be given here. For further detail, please refer to the separate 1956 Annual Report for the Division of Tuberculosis Hospitalization.

Fewer persons made application for Tuberculosis Hospitalization this year than last year by 23 applicants. This likewise affected the number of approvals which were fewer than last year. There were 346 cases in sanatoria this year to 377 last year. Greater use has been made of outpatient care and home care than last year. For comparison, refer to the following table:

*Of the pulmonary cases approved for care during the year, 45.6 per cent were in for advanced stages of the disease. These persons were not of any particular age group. The range was from children under 10 years through 80 years and over for adults; however the age group with the greatest frequency was 40 through 49 years.*

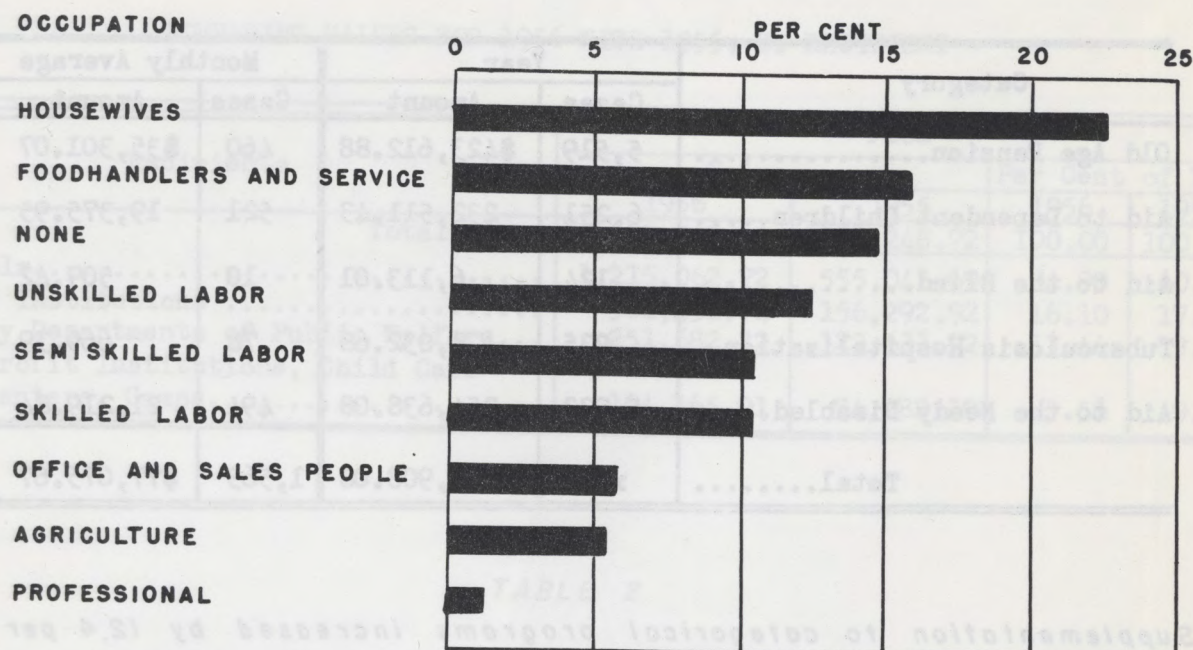
*There were 54 persons who were discharged from sanatoria during the year. These persons had a median average of 10.5 months of hospitalization. When they were released, 33 were arrested cases and 21 were inactive. Many more cases than this were terminated. Terminations from sanatoria total 215. Reasons for this action other than discharges were: Death, left against advice, disciplinary action, nontuberculous, maximum treatment given, and transferred to outpatient or to home care.*

*Supplementation to categorical programs increased by 12.4 per cent more than last year. It was necessary to expend \$924,908.08 to meet pressing needs not covered by the basic assistance grants.*

*The Old Age Pension received the greatest share of the supplementation to meet nursing home care costs.*

*A monthly average of 1,563 cases received supplementation: 521 Aid to Dependent Children, 494 Aid to the Needy Disabled, 460 Old Age Pension, 78 Tuberculosis Hospitalization, and 10 Aid to the Blind.*

*In addition to supplementation, counties expended \$1,335,456.21 for contract doctors, county nurses, county hospital and county farm operation, medicine and other including commodity distribution.*

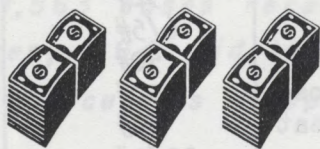
## SURPLUS COMMODITIES



*Surplus commodity distribution in Colorado has meant a good deal of money value-wise, as well as to provide better diet for many persons: School hot lunches, state institutions, public welfare recipients, and others in camps, child care centers, and nonprofit institutions.*



*It will be noticed that the table on page 11 indicates an increase by 104 per cent over the amount distributed in 1955. This is true only as to dollar value, not in actual volume of commodities. The schools received more commodities than they did the year before with*



*less going to nonprofit organizations, children's camps and care centers. State and county agencies received practically the same amount.*

*Listing of items reveals that beans, butter, cheese, meal and flour, lard, lunch meat, milk, rice, and shortening were distributed to county departments. A few extra items, such as fruit, were distributed to state institutions. County departments are expected to participate to a larger extent during 1957.*



# MANY RECIPIENTS MOVE ABOUT

In the accompanying table it will be noted that the counties are ranked from high to low; i.e., the county with the greatest net gain of transfers is listed first and the county with the greatest loss is listed last. As for the extremes, note Jefferson County had a net gain of 50 cases while Las Animas had a net loss of 61 cases.

As for the movement between counties, Denver transferred out 289 of which 179 went to the tri-county area of Jefferson, Arapahoe, and Adams Counties. However, Denver received from these same counties 131 cases to make Denver score a loss of 48 cases to these counties, although as an over-all for the year Denver received more cases. Other counties transferred heavily to Denver. For example, of the 72 cases leaving Las Animas County, 33 went to Denver. Of Pueblo's 57 transfers, 18 went to Denver County. Of Weld County's 50 transfers, 17 came to Denver. The other cases from these counties were scattered through many other counties in small numbers.

Who are the public assistance recipients who move? Of the 1,308 who moved 1,071 or 82 per cent were Old Age Pension recipients, 148 were Aid to Dependent Children families, 85 were Aid to the Needy Disabled, and 4 were Blind cases.

## SERVICES FOR THE BLIND

*During 1956:*

*Four home teachers made 1,988 calls on 384 blind individuals.*

*1,020 lessons were given in Braille reading and writing.*

*170 lessons were given in various types of handicraft.*

*690 lessons were given in typing, script writing, and on other subjects.*

*46 radios provided by the American Foundation for the Blind were loaned to most needy blind persons.*

*A few reconditioned Remington electric shavers were given to blind men.*

*630 talking book machines were in use on December 31st in 34 Colorado counties.*

*Home teachers made visits to blind persons in 20 counties during the year.*

Many children found their way to the county departments of public welfare seeking Child Welfare services. A total of 3,817 came from many sources. Parents were responsible for only 9.2 per cent of the referrals. Law enforcement agencies referred 26.8 per cent of the children while other agencies than the county departments referred 26.7 per cent of the children. These were the major sources of referral and account for 53.5 per cent of all children referred.

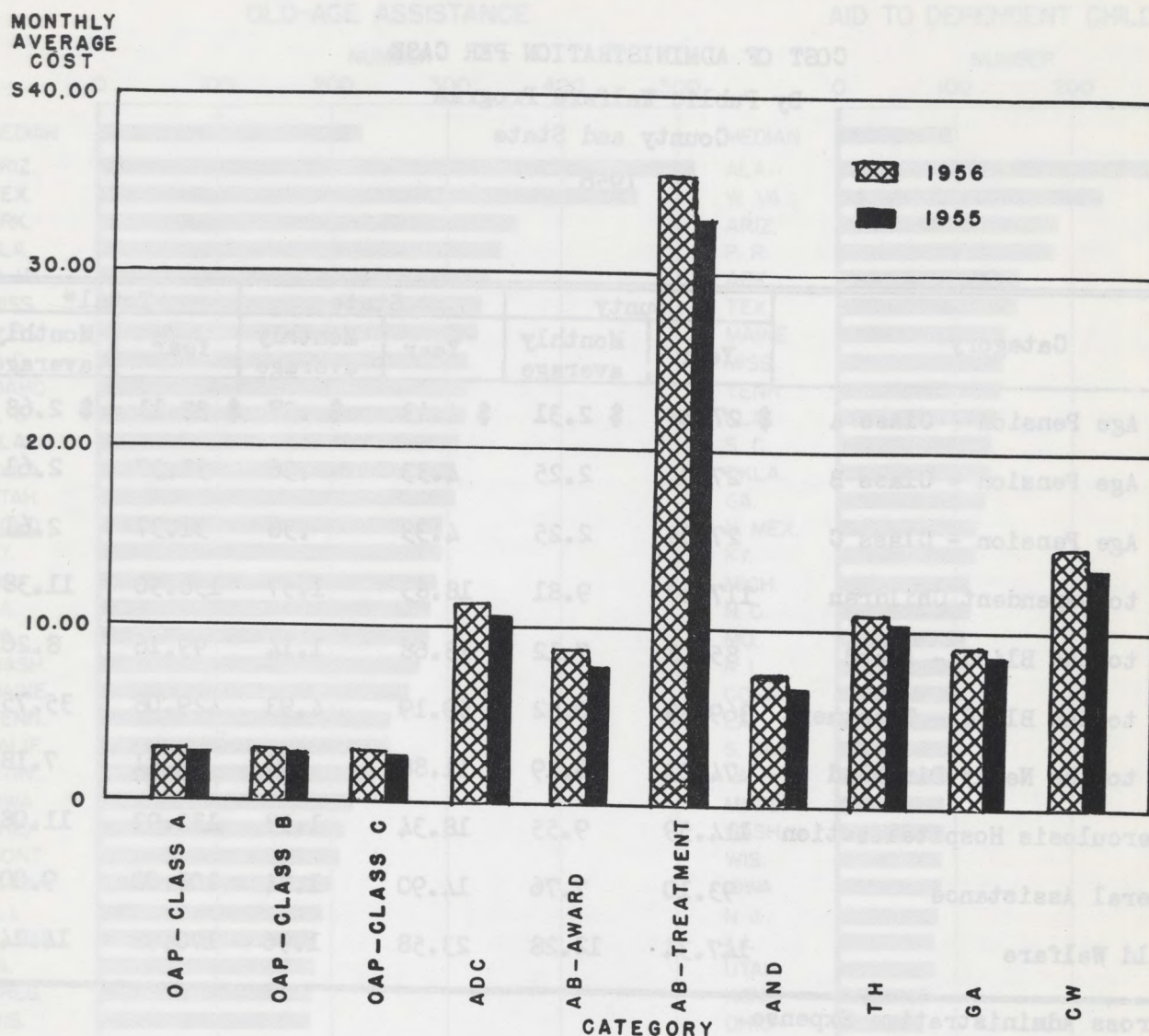
A monthly average of 2,056 children received care and service, 1,240 of these children received casework services only. As will be noted in an accompanying chart, there were 563 foster homes used during the year to provide substitute homes for 1,346 different children. There was a monthly average of 816 children in foster homes during the calendar year 1956.

Services to children were no longer necessary for 3,659 children and these cases were terminated during the year. Of this group, 166 were completed adoptions. It may be of interest to note that of the remaining 2,789 active cases as of the close of the year, 416 were children in adoptive homes. In other words, for every adoptive case completed, approximately three others were in process.

The above chart indicates a rise in the cost of servicing every category of assistance and service. Actual monthly average cost per case for administration ranged from \$2.61 for the pension to \$14.24 for a Child Welfare case. Aid to the Blind Treatment is in a class by itself with an extreme high of \$35.75 per month case cost; however, fortunately, this program is small.

For further consideration of administration, it may be interesting to note that though the per case cost for the pension was low, because of the caseload being 76 per cent pension recipients, 46 cents out of every administrative dollar was used for servicing the pension, 21 cents for Aid to Dependent Children, 11 and one-half cents for Aid to the Needy Disabled, 10 cents for General Assistance, 9 cents for Child Welfare, one cent for Aid to the Blind, one cent for Tuberculosis Hospitalization, and one-half cent for miscellaneous expenses.

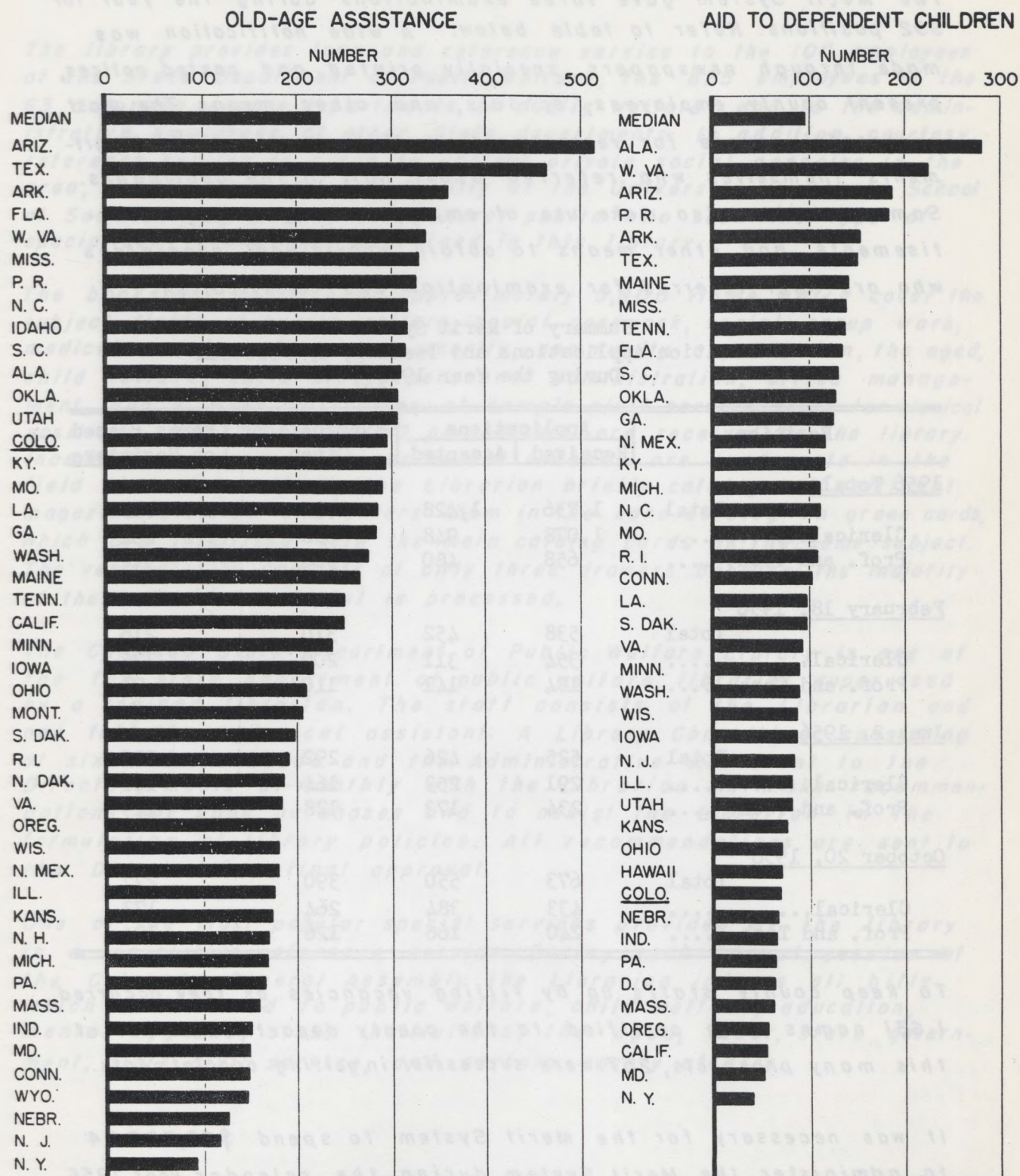

## PERSONNEL

The Merit System gave three examinations during the year for 992 positions. Refer to table below. A wide notification was made through newspapers, specially printed and posted notices, present county employees, schools, and other means. The most successful source for recruitment is through the county departments themselves who referred about half of the applicants. Some counties also make use of employment agencies, advertisements, and other means to obtain provisional appointees who are later referred for examination and certification.

To keep county staffs up by filling vacancies as they occurred, 1,631 names were certified to the county departments. Out of this many prospects, 257 were successful in getting appointments.

It was necessary for the Merit System to spend \$23,766.94 to administer the Merit System during the calendar year 1956. This was only .8 of one per cent equivalent of the total salaries paid county employees --- \$2,837,568.94.



## PUBLIC WELFARE LIBRARY

*The library provides loan and reference service to the 100 employees of the State Department of Public Welfare, the 825 employees of the 63 Colorado county departments of public welfare, and to the administrative employees of other State departments. In addition, courtesy reference service is given to various private social agencies in the area, to the students and faculty of the University of Denver School of Social Work, and to the general public who seek the type of specialized information contained in this library.*

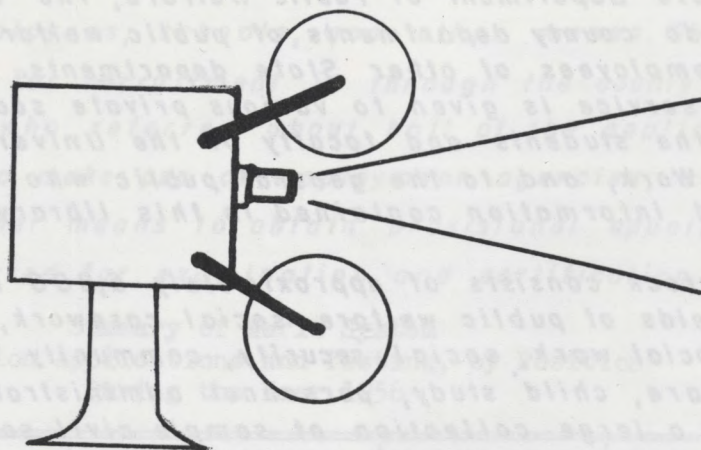
*The bookstock consists of approximately 5,800 items which cover the subject fields of public welfare, social casework, social group work, medical social work, social security, community organization, the aged, child welfare, child study, personnel administration, office management, and a large collection of sample civil service tests for clerical positions. Approximately 50 periodicals are received by the library. Inasmuch as commercial periodical indexes are inadequate in the field of social welfare, the Librarian briefly catalogs all pertinent magazine articles and enters them in the card catalog on green cards, which are interfiled with the main catalog cards on the same subject. The vertical file consists of only three drawers because the majority of the pamphlet material is processed.*

*The Colorado State Department of Public Welfare Library is one of the few state department of public welfare libraries supervised by a trained librarian. The staff consists of the Librarian and one full time clerical assistant. A Library Committee, consisting of six division heads and the Administrative Assistant to the Director, meets bi-monthly with the Librarian to make recommendations for book purchases and to assist the Librarian in the formulation of library policies. All recommendations are sent to the Director for final approval.*

*One of the most popular special services provided by the library is a legislative reference service. During each annual session of the Colorado General Assembly the Librarian indexes all bills which are related to public welfare, child welfare, education, mental hygiene, state institutions, the aged, labor, state government, state civil service, and certain county affairs.*



**FILMS AVAILABLE THROUGH COUNTY DEPARTMENTS  
FROM THE PUBLIC WELFARE LIBRARY**



As has been the practice since issue of Bulletin CSDPW 998, booking of motion picture films is available through the local county departments of public welfare. Procedures in detail were published in "Pre-Vue" by the library. Some films are owned by the State Department and others are available through the library from other film libraries. These films are available for civic group showings as well as for county staff. Showing of film must not be for profit and no door charge can be made.

The Librarian has collected film library catalogues from approximately 20 film libraries located in Colorado and other parts of the nation. "Pre-Vue" is published by the library periodically which contains descriptive information, rental data, and instructions regarding loan procedures. As a result of this service, 15 showings of film were given during the year.

**BOOKS FOR NON-SOCIAL WORK STAFF AVAILABLE**

The library has publications of interest to the county department non-social work staff. They can get on personal loan a variety of books on secretarial science, office management, business letter writing, business English, grammar, manual of style of writing, shorthand, typing, and others. County departments also can use these for staff development and preparation for merit system examinations. Also available are sample examination tests by Pergrande and by Arco.
