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TO THE GOVERNOR

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OFFICE OF SECRETARY OF STATE OF COLORADO.

To His Excellency,
OLIVER H. SHOUP,
Governor of Colorado.

Esteemed Sir: In submitting the following biennial report of the business transacted in the office of Secretary of State for the fiscal years of 1919 and 1920, ending November 30, 1920, I take the liberty of calling your attention, briefly, to the needs of this department of state.

A comparison of the business transacted in the various bureaus of this office for the past few years is the best evidence of the constantly growing importance of the department. During the biennial period of 1915-1916, the grand total receipts were \$613,775.13; during the biennial period of 1917-1918, the grand total reached \$1,224,594.61; and for 1919-1920, the grand total was \$2,032,689.66. And while only a small part of the funds so collected revert to the general revenues of the state, all the moneys go into highly beneficial channels—as, for example, the Flat Tax collections, amounting to \$421,598.16 during 1919-1920, apply to the retirement of state war bonds, in accordance with the terms of an enactment of 1917 it was my honor to have introduced in the Twenty-first General Assembly. In this connection, I may say that a total of \$667,434.16 has been collected in the Flat Tax department since the enactment of this measure. This means that fully two-thirds of the war bonds issued by the state to meet the extraordinary expenses incurred by Colorado on account of the world's war have been paid without costing the taxpayers a dollar, the corporations paying this indebtedness. The motor vehicle license fees, less operating expenses, amounting to a total of less than 9 per cent., revert to the state and county roads funds. The present license fee system which became effective January 1, 1920, has proved highly satisfactory.

A familiarity with the corporation bureau of this office will convince even the most skeptical that a corporation "blue sky" law is absolutely essential for the protection of honestly conducted companies as well as for investors. Our records are burdened with the names of hundreds, if not thousands, of "wild cat" corporations that were organized and have been operated solely to defraud the public. This has resulted in great loss to investors and the credit of legitimately conducted corporations, not to mention the discredit that has been cast upon the state, generally.

All salaries should be increased, especially those salaries which are now less than \$200 a month. ~~Political Officer~~ Political Officer is not a political "soft snap" in the office of Secretary of State, I can assure you. And it may be added that because of the nature of the business transacted, it is highly important that only the most competent employes obtainable be intrusted as aids to the secretary.
