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## Colorado Discretionary Aviation Grant Program

Each year, the Colorado Aeronautical Board administers the distribution of the Colorado Aviation Fund through individual airport grants and statewide aviation system improvements. A share of the 2007 revenues from aviation fuel taxes awarded nearly \$10.8 million in the form of discretionary aviation grants.

The awarded grants were used to address airfield maintenance and safety, local match for federallyfunded airport improvements, long-term planning, and system-wide safety programs.

### Tax Revenue Reimbursements

Publicly-owned , public-use airports are recipients of aviation fuel excise and sales tax reimbursements which equal \$.04 per gallon excise tax and 65% of the total amount of fuel sales tax collections at their airport. These monthly revenue rebates are ear-marked for aviation purposes such as airport operations, maintenance, and personnel costs.

## Colorado Showcases at NBAA

The Colorado Division of Aeronautics along with eleven Colorado constituents attended the 60th Annual National Business Aviation Association (NBAA) Convention and Meeting and Convention in Atlanta, Georgia. Participants of the 2500 sq. ft. Colorado pavilion included a grouping of Colorado airports, economic development organizations, and Colorado-based aviation businesses.

The NBAA convention is considered one of the world's premier business aviation attractions for corporate and individual owners of business aircraft. The 2007 convention realized a record total of 1,152 exhibitors with a record attendance of more than 32,000 people.

The purpose of attending NBAA is to showcase what Colorado can offer aviation-related businesses. Colorado has many critical elements important to aviation-related companies; educated workforce, premier airport system, and incentives on the state and local level for doing business in Colorado.

In addition, the delegation is informed the convention attendees that Colorado is a magnificent tourism destination, in which the entire state can be reached by the Colorado airport system.

## State Infrastructure Bank

The Colorado Transportation Commission supports local operators of transportation facilities with funds available through a low interest revolving loan program. This unique program enacted by the Colorado Legislature in 1998, and adopted by CDOT in 1999. The Colorado Element of the Colorado State Infrastructure Bank (SIB) funds eleven airport accounts totalling over \$32 million.

Loans awarded to airports from the SIB have been used for projects such as capital airport improvements; air traffic control towers, snow removal equipment, and pavement reconstruction. Loans have also been utilized for land acquisitions protecting airports from residential encroachment.

## **Airport Pavement Condition Indexing**

The Colorado Division of Aeronautics undertakes an annual analysis of existing airport pavement surfaces. The analysis process is called Pavement Condition Indexing (PCI), where airport pavements are surveyed based on several distress types. Each pavement sample is surveyed for distresses and is given a PCI score based on the distress severity, e.g., the lower the PCI number, the more severe the pavement distress. Each pavement sample PCI score is compiled into an engineering software program, where an overall PCI is calculated for a particular airport.

The airport PCI results are an important tool for the Division's pavement maintenance program, allowing for better priority allocation of pavement maintenance funds. The PCI results are also able to identify the future life cycle of airport pavements. These projections help identify long term needs and the planning for future capital pavement improvement funding. The Division's goal is to maintain Colorado's airport pavements at an average PCI score of 75 or above, see Figure 2.

Pavement indexing reports show the Crack Fill Rebate Program has had a positive impact on Colorado's airport pavement conditions. The Crack Fill Rebate Program provides Colorado airports a 75% rebate on the purchase of crack sealant materials. More than \$50,000 was reimbursed to 17 airports that took advantage of the program. PCI reports identified that 93% of the Colorado's airport pavements were in good to fair condition. Proper routine pavement maintenance will insure the State's ability to maintain airport pavements at a PCI value of 75 or higher.



## Airport Capital Improvement Program

With the assistance of a grant in the amount of \$234,895 from the Federal Aviation Administration, the Division helps guide airports in identifying short and long term needs and available state and federal funding. This comprehensive planning by CDOT-Aeronautics addresses maintenance and improvement needs of the State's system of airports.

General aviation airports received a total of \$18,435,136 in FAA discretionary dollars for capital construction, while commercial service airports received \$53,874,000 discretionary dollars in 2007.

In 2007, FAA General Aviation Entitlement funds totaling \$4,675,200 went to non-commercial airport facilities for planning, airfield main-tenance, land acquisition, ramps and terminal upgrades.

Meeker Airport, Lake County Airport, Greeley-Weld County Airport and Front Range Airport participated in state, federal and locally funded runway rehabilitation projects which will provide improved surfaces and facilities.

Significant projects were completed at the Aspen-Pitkin County Airport and the Burlington-Kit Carson County Airport where complete runway rehabilitations took place while the Yampa Valley Regional Airport near Hayden completed a multi-year project including a new terminal along with expanded ramp and vehicle parking areas. Runway and taxiway extension work continues at the Eagle County Regional Airport in order to improve its ability to accommodate large commercial aircraft; runway reconstruction was completed at the Colorado Springs Municipal Airport and Stevens Field in Pagosa Springs opened a newly constructed partial parallel taxiway in 2007.

Centennial Airport in the Denver metro area completed a runway rehabilitation project while Rocky Mountain Metropolitan Airport (formerly Jefferson County Airport) is getting closer to completion of a multi-year taxiway relocation project and Grand Junction Regional Airport (formerly Walker Field) continues its multi-year land side parking lot and roadway system complete reconstruction.

# Colorado's Vision and Approach for Aviation Safety

Survey information was previously supplied to the Federal Aviation Administration in preparation for non-precision GPS approaches at eleven critical airports where no previous instrument landing systems were available. In the past year approaches have been completed for Holyoke Municipal Airport in Holyoke, Monte Vista Municipal Airport in Monte Vista and Hopkins Field in Nucla. The remaining eight airports are in various stages of the approach production process.

Due to increased demand and lack of radar coverage at Colorado's mountain airports, multi-lateration radar and Automated Dependent Surveillance-Broadcast (ADS-B) facilities will be tested at several facilities in northwest Colorado. Conventional radar is unable to pickup aircraft once they drop below certain elevations. The improved coverage will impact the way Denver Center – Air Traffic Control "sees" aircraft in the mountainous terrain. The initial testing as well as anticipated future expansion of this new radar coverage is being supported by the Colorado Aeronautical Board, the Colorado Transportation Commission and the Federal Aviation Administration-Air Traffic Organization. Work has already begun on the test areas in Moffat, Routt and Garfield Counties. Upon completion of testing, the first phase is expected to be up and running within eighteen months.
