L.E.A.F. Is a program created by the Colorado Legislature through statute to provide supplemental funding for local, county or city and county agencies to enforce Colorado's impaired driving laws.

L.E.A.F statutes are located in Colorado Revised Statutes:

C.R.S. 43-4-401

<u>C.R.S. 43-4-402</u>

C.R.S. 43-4-403

C.R.S. 43-4-404

Funds are collected for L.E.A.F from every person who is convicted of, pleads guilty to, or receives a deferred sentence pursuant to section 18-1.3-102, C.R.S., for a violation of any of the offenses specified in section 42-4-1301 (1) or (2), C.R.S.

Convicted persons are required to pay seventy-five dollars, which shall be deposited into the fund, and fifteen dollars, which shall be deposited into the county treasury of the county in which the conviction occurred".

- The Colorado Department of Health and Environment (CDPHE) receives an annual appropriation out of the moneys in the fund in an amount sufficient to pay for the costs of evidential breath alcohol testing, including any education needs associated with such testing, and implied consent specialists.
- The Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI) receives and annual appropriation to pay for the costs of toxicology laboratory services, including any education needs associated with such services.
- Of the funds remaining after CDPHE and CBI allocations, eighty percent is allocated to CDOT and twenty percent is allocated to Colorado Department of Human Services (CDHS).
- The amount of money convicted person are required to pay into the L.E.A.F. for enforcement has not changed since the inception of the program.

 Collected funds allocated to the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) are utilized by Colorado Local Law Enforcement to enforce impaired driving laws.

Purpose of CDOT L.E.A.F. Program:

The purpose of the L.E.A.F. program is to provide funds to qualified local Colorado Law Enforcement agencies to enforce impaired driving violations through high visibility enforcement.

Nature of the CDOT L.E.A.F. Program:

The inherent features and characteristics of the L.E.A.F. program are:

- Colorado Law Enforcement Agencies funding for L.E.A.F. is based on problem identification analysis.
- Funds can be utilized for enforcement and equipment used to address impaired driving.
- L.E.A.F. is part of CDOT's comprehensive impaired driving enforcement and education plan.



The CDOT, Office of Transportation Safety (OTS), Highway Safety Office (HSO) administers the L.E.A.F. program. Participating law enforcement agencies are selected to receive funding through an application process, which includes problem identification



analysis, a detailed budget and a plan to address specific problems with impaired driving in their local communities.

Participating agencies are required to submit quarterly reports outlining activities, obstacles, and reporting arrests through CDOT's website.

L.E.A.F. funding has been utilized to make a significant impact on impaired driving in Colorado, and the need for ongoing increased enforcement, as well as public education about the laws and consequences, are vital to maintain the success of the program.

Financial Highlights:

For fiscal year 2015-2016 the Colorado Department of Transportation was allocated \$721,000.00 in L.E.A.F. to use towards impaired driving enforcement and for the purchasing of equipment to address impaired driving offenses.

A total of \$ 512,657.00 or seventy one percent was expended.

Funds unspent are rolled to the next fiscal year.

HIGH-VISIBILITY DRUNK DRIVING LAW ENFORCEMENT

43-4-901. High-visibility drunk driving law enforcement

The Department of Transportation, in implementing the strategic transportation project investment program, shall, as a priority, increase to fifteen episodes annually the number of high-visibility drunk driving law enforcement episodes that the department oversees. The high-visibility drunk driving law enforcement episodes required by this section shall be independent of, and in addition to, the drunk driving prevention and law enforcement program described in part 4 of this article. 
