REPORT.

To his Excellency,

JOB A. COOPER,

Governor of Colorado:

SIR:

In compliance with law I have the honor to submit herewith the Seventh Biennial Report of the State Treasurer, for the two fiscal years ending November 30, 1890.

This report shows the receipts, disbursements and balances, also a detailed statement of the transactions of this office.

The total debt of the State November 30, 1890, was as follows:

Outstanding warrants bearing 6 per cent. interest	\$1,393,354 47
Outstanding certificates of indebtedness bearing 6 per cent interest	86,890 49
Outstanding loco weed certificates, no interest	16,910 24
Capital building bonds bearing 3½ per cent. interest	150,000 00
Total	<u>\$1,647,155 20</u>

To offset this amount there is \$232,938.57, to the credit of the General Revenue Fund, leaving the principal of the outstanding indebtedness \$1,414,216.63, from which amount there is to be deducted the uncollected and delinquent taxes, for which I respectfully call your attention to the estimate of the State Auditor.

Of the \$1,393,354.47 outstanding warrants, the State holds \$848,034.67 in the several investment funds, as per itemized statement in general summary of this report.

The \$150,000.00 Capitol Building bonds, the entire amount, I have purchased for the Public School Investment fund.

On January 1, 1891, there will be \$150,000.00 more of the same bonds purchased for the same fund, which will leave but a small balance in the Public School Investment fund for future investments until such time when more of the school lands shall have been sold.

Section 1403 of the General Statutes requires the fiscal year to commence on December 1, and end on November 30. With the increased amount of business in the offices of Auditor and Treasurer, it is not possible, without a largely increased clerical force, to have the two biennial reports in the time required by section 17, Article IV. of the Constitution. I would therefore recommend the same be changed, and the fiscal year commence July 1 and end June 30.

This office requires more clerical help, and the present salary of the Deputy State Treasurer is not sufficient for a person competent and qualified for so responsible a position.

In compliance with section 285 of the General Statutes, Incorporated and Savings Banks only make a report to this office. I would suggest that the law be amended so as to include private banks, and that they report quarterly, instead of semi-annually; also, that the law may be made to create an officer as an Inspector of Finance, whose duty it should be, with full and effective power, to examine said banks whenever deemed advisable; and that the same officer be empowered to examine State and County Treasurers' offices, and to give instructions to those County officers who may ask or require information as to the conduct of their offices in relation to State affairs. New men in office is the cause for this work; such an officer, I would suggest, would be the Secretary of the State Board of Equalization.

I think it my duty to call your attention to the matter of Bounties paid by the State. I would urge the repeal of all bounty laws. For wolf and coyote scalps the State paid, during the past two years, \$9,583.50; for bear scalps, \$9,867.55; for lion scalps, \$5,330.00; and the amount paid in 1890 is largely in excess of that paid in 1889, and in the case of wolves and coyotes especially so, which is a proof of importation, rather than extermination. As to bears and lions, there is no proof of any having been killed merely for bounty. Sportsmen will never pass one by if there is a possible chance of capturing one of them. In one County, remitting over \$8,000 to this office for the General Revenue Fund, but \$26.21 of the entire amount was in cash, the balance being bounties, mostly of the old Loco certificates; another, remitting over \$4,000.00, but \$64.15 was in cash. These are the worst cases; but the amounts paid are very large for our young State.

In regard to the financial condition of the State, I would recommend the question of a bonded indebtedness be submitted to the electors of the State, to redeem the present outstanding warrants and certificates of indebtedness, well knowing that such a suggestion at this time will meet with strong opposition. Yet, knowing the benefit it would be to the State, I urge the consideration of the matter. The outstanding warrants are drawing six per cent., the certificates the same. The State has in the investment funds, \$848,034.67, exclusive of the \$150,000.00 Capitol building bonds. I would have the Legislature authorize the Treasurer to call in all those warrants and certificates held by outside investors, and pay them, with the accrued interest, to the amount held in the investment funds, there to be held until such time as the bonded indebtedness could be legally created. Then fix the rate of interest at such a rate as would be considered by the Board of State Debt, limiting the rate to 4 per cent.; but I would sug-

gest it be fixed as the Capitol building bonds, at the rate of three and one-half per cent., which would be a saving to the State of more than \$25,000.00 per year; and I believe the electors would be willing to adopt it, rather than have the question of repudiation thrown at the the State under the present system.

In concluding my report, I take this opportunity of extending my acknowledgments to yourself and other State officials for courtesies received, and also to publicly thank my efficient deputy, Mr. L. C. Tracy.

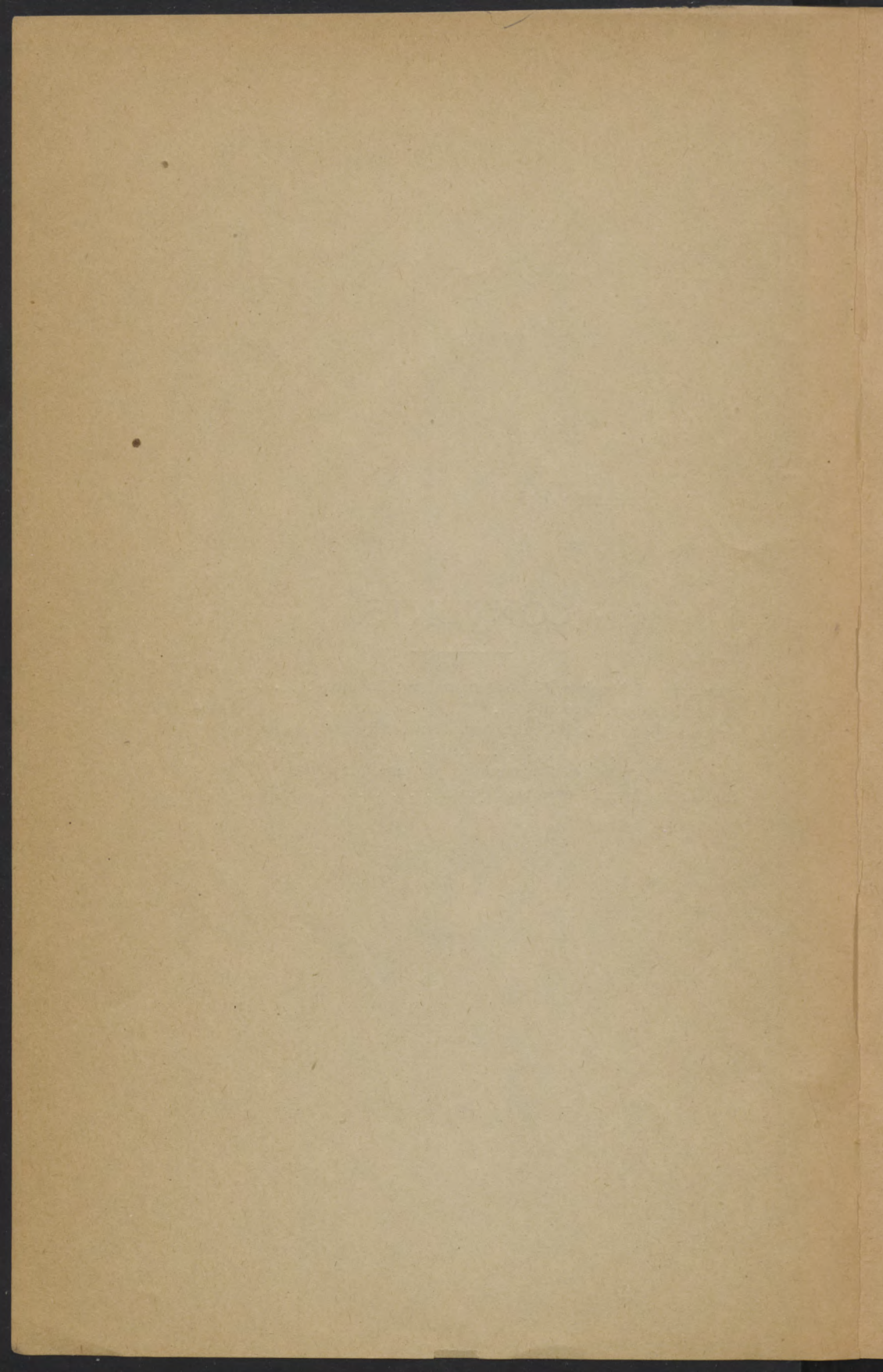

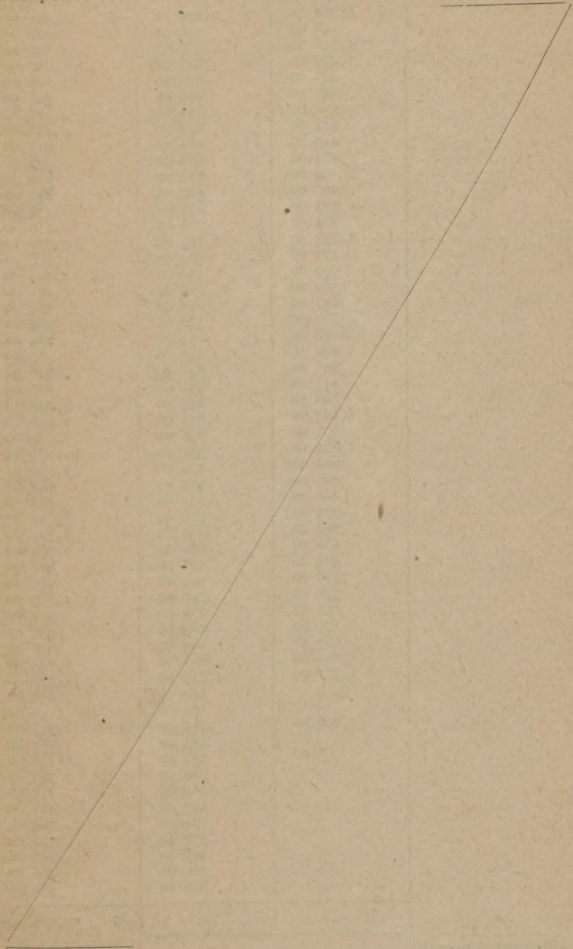

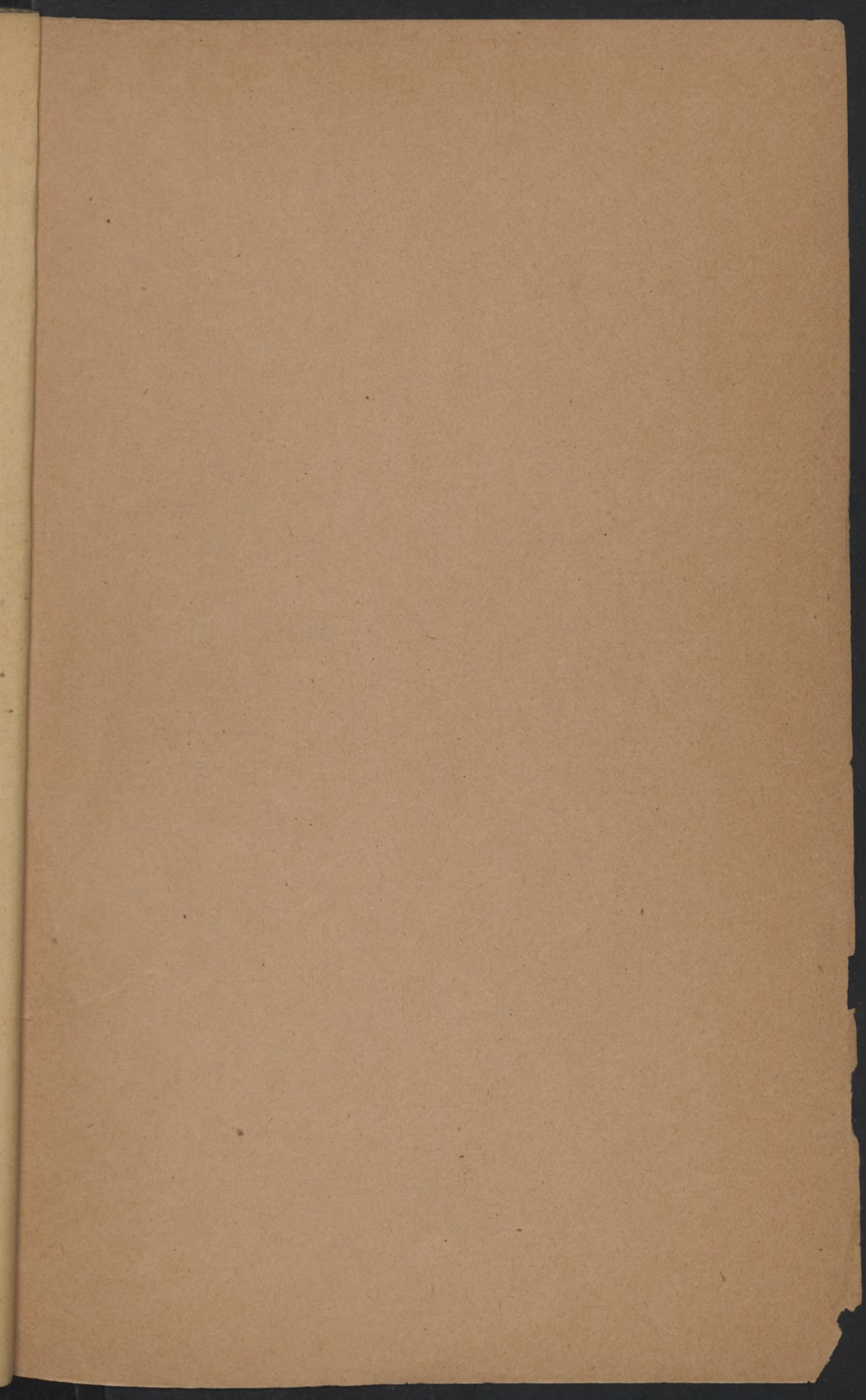
