STATE TREASURER'S OFFICE, DENVER, COLORADO, December 1, 1912.

To the Honorable Members of the Legislature of the State of Colorado.

Gentlemen: I have the honor to submit to you the report of the Treasury Department for the biennial period commencing December 1, 1910, and ending November 30, 1912; also the report of the Inheritance Tax Department, with recommendations, and the report of the License Department, with recommendations.

You will find that the collections of the Inheritance Tax Department for the period were \$413,147.91—which exceeds all former periods—at an expense to the state of \$17,088.00. There are several recommendations from this department which should be made a part of the law, in order to make the department more efficient and to facilitate collections.

Upon examination of the report of the License Department you will find that there was collected from liquor licenses, license transfer fees, and detective licenses the sum of \$119,276.50, which is an increase over all former periods since the adoption of the local option law in Colorado. These collections were made at an expense of the state of \$16,312.74.

The recommendations for an amendment to the law show that the department can be made more efficient in its work.

BIENNIAL REPORT

OF THE

INTEREST ON STATE FUNDS.

Interest on state funds for the period amounted to \$88,069.88, an increase of \$3,372.56 over the preceding period, and an increase of \$22,831.90 over the period of 1907-1908.

The funds are deposited in 100 banks throughout every section of the state, this being double the number of banks ever having state money at any previous period. These banks pay the state 3 per cent per annum (quarterly) on their demand certificates.

The open, or checking, account is maintained in Denver, from which the state receives 2½ per cent on daily balances.

FUNDING OUTSTANDING WARRANTS.

At the general election of 1910 a constitutional amendment, providing for a bond issue of \$2,115,000.00 to fund the outstanding warrants of 1887-1888 and 1889, was submitted and carried. Suit was brought in the District Court of Denver county to declare the passage of the amendment illegal. The case was carried from the District Court to the Supreme Court of the State of Colorado, and from there to the United States Supreme Court, in each of which courts the amendment was declared constitutional. Although no bonds have been issued at this date, the exchange for the old warrants will be made.

BOND OF STATE TREASURER.

Section 1790 of the Constitution reads as follows:

Outh of State Treasurer—Bond.

That the state treasurer shall, on or before the second Tuesday in January, after his election, and before entering upon the duties of his office, take and subscribe the oath required by the constitution, and give a bond to the State of Colorado in the sum of one million dollars, with not less than ten sureties, to be approved by the governor, attorney general and secretary of state. The governor, with the concurrence of either the attorney general or the secretary of state, whenever he deems the sureties on the bond of the state treasurer to be insufficient for the said sum of one million dollars, may demand, and the state treasurer shall give, additional bonds and sureties, to be approved by the governor, attorney general and secretary of state. The State treasurer lastly elected shall give such bond, and procure the approval thereof, prior to entering upon the duties of his office.

The giving of personal bonds, in many instances, is detrimental to the public service.

The bond of the State Treasurer is \$1,000,000, and, furnished by a surety company, would require the payment of a premium of \$2,500. No officer can afford to pay that amount out of his salary.

In view of the foregoing, I recommend that the Constitution be amended providing that surety bonds be given by the State Treasurer and all state officers and employes for the faithful performance of their duties, and that a sufficient appropriation be made to pay the premiums on such bonds.

Such a law, when enacted, would enable the State and its officers to exercise full control and direction over the deposit and custody of public moneys, and I believe it would result in better safe-guarding of the public funds and generally promote the interests of the State.

PUBLIC SCHOOL FUND.

The public school funds are rapidly increasing, now having a total of \$2,627,413.19, of which \$1,501,615.19 is invested in state warrants drawing 4% interest.

I have purchased for investment in the school fund all 3% Colorado State Bonds offered for sale on a basis that will pay the school fund at the rate of 4%; there being now invested in these bonds \$559,480.18, representing a face value of \$645,300, and would invest the balance of the school money in the new bond issue of 1910, buying all bonds offered at a basis of 4%.

FLAT TAX FEES HELD BY FORMER OFFICIALS.

Upon coming into office as State Auditor in 1909, I found that tax fees designated as "Protest Fees" amounting to \$31,810.49, same having been collected by officers prior to 1909.

After demand had been made upon the various officials, suit was commenced to recover the amount. Former Secretary of State O'Connor paid \$16.546.31 principal and \$808.57 interest, being the amount held by him.

The case against former State Auditor Holmberg and his bondsmen was tried in the District Court and indement rendered for \$11,110.44 and interest, and upon appeal by them to the Supreme Court of the State the judgment of the lower court was affirmed and judgment entered against Holmberg and his bondsmen in the sum of \$11,110.44 principal and \$8,112.34 interest.

The case against former Secretary of State Cowie and his bondsmen was tried in the District Court of Denver county and judgment rendered against them and the case is now in the Supreme Court of the State, npon appeal from the decision of the lower court.

EXPENSE OF LICENSE DEPARTMENT.

Prior to this administration the license inspectors were provided with free transportation to travel in the discharge of their duties. I found early in my term of State Treasurer that the railroads did not care to give so much transportation to departments having an expense account, and it became necessary for me to provide each inspector with mileage books over the roads they traveled on and as this promises to be the order for the future. I would recommend a larger appropriation for traveling expenses of this department.

In regard to the expense connected with this office, I wish to state that the law provides for five license inspectors. I employed only four license inspectors, thus saving the State \$3,000, the salary of one inspector and \$1,200 traveling expenses, making a total of \$4,200.00.

The Long Appropriation Bill also provided for an extra clerk in the State Treasurer's office at a salary of \$1,500.00 per annum, which was not filled; this making a saving to the State of \$3,000.

Dear Sir:—In response to your request for a statement as to the proceedings with reference to two informations filed in the District Court of Fremont County against D. E. Gibson, W. M. Gibson, A. R. Frisbie, John Cleghorn, and Herman Loehr, I beg leave to state that:

Prior to my induction into this office, my predecessor, Hon. John T. Barnett, on December 23, 1910, filed in the District Court of Fremont County two informations against the above-named parties—one information charging them with conspiracy to defraud the state of \$25,000 in the sale of certain goods, wares, and merchandise to the State Penitentiary; and the other information charging them with obtaining said sum of money by false pretenses.

Mr. Locke, the district attorney of the judicial district in which Fremont County is situated, had previously refused to file these informations, and at the time the informations were presented objected to their being filed without his consent. The then district judge, however, permitted the filing of the informations, without passing upon any questions of law involved.

Upon assuming the duties of office, on January 10, 1911, I, with the assistance of my deputy, Mr. A. A. Lee, proceeded to investigate the evidence at our disposal in these cases, and also undertook a new and independent investigation with reference to the matters involved, with the result that we determined to pros-

ecute these cases to a conclusion.

We thereupon required the defendants to plead to the informations, and they filed a motion to dismiss the informations on the ground that the Attorney General, upon the request of the Governor, had no right to file informations in a trial court, such right being exclusively in the district attorney of the proper judicial district. So far as we are advised, these were the first criminal cases in which an Attorney General, upon the request of the Governor, attempted to file such informations, and the question presented to the trial court was, therefore, a new one in this state.

In the month of March, 1911, we argued the motion before the District Court of Fremont County, with the result that the motions were sustained, and by order of court the informations were dismissed. From this judgment of the court, and under the act of 1907 relating to writs of error upon the part of the people, we took the case to the Supreme Court for review, with the result that, in the spring of 1912, the Supreme Court by a unanimous decision upheld all of our contentions and sustained the right of

the Attorney General to prosecute criminal cases upon the request of the Governor, reversed the decision of the court below, and remanded the case for further proceedings. To this decision the defendants filed a motion for a rehearing, which was subsequently denied, and this case is reported under the name of The People vs. Gibson, in 125 Pac. Rep., 531.

Thereupon we proceeded to have the case redocketed in the District Court of Fremont County, and to have the defendants rearrested and give new bail for their appearance in the District

Court, which was done.

The defendants thereupon moved for a bill of particulars with reference to the matters set out in the complaint, and the same was granted, not, however, to the extent prayed for in the motion of the defendants. We then required each defendant to plead to the informations, and the case was set for trial on November 18, 1912.

Without going into detail with reference to the exhaustive and thorough manner with which the case was tried on both sides, both as to the facts and the law, it is sufficient to say that the trial was begun on November 18, and was not concluded until the 17th of December, thus requiring twenty-nine days for the trial.

The case was given to the jury about 11:30 on Saturday morning, December 14, and the jury returned into court with a verdict on the 17th day of December, about 1:30 in the afternoon, after being out about seventy-four hours, finding the defendants not guilty, but stating that it was the sense of the jury that the defendants were guilty of gross negligence in the conduct of the affairs of the State Penitentiary, and that the circumstances were suspicious in the extreme, and reprimanding the defendants for the transaction of the state's business in such fashion.

Inheritance Tax Department

OFFICE OF STATE TREASURER OF COLORADO DENVER

December 15, 1912.

Hon. Roady Kenehan. State Treasurer.

Dear Sir: I hand you herewith a report of the Inheritance Tax Department, covering receipts, disbursements, tax assessed and outstanding, and all other work appertaining to the department.

In connection therewith, I would recommend that numerons changes be made in the revenue laws relative to the inheritance tax.

To facilitate the work, the department should be consolidated and under one head.

Section 5553, Revised Statutes of 1908, is not in conformity with the probate laws of the state, inasmuch as it penalizes the beneficiaries of an inheritance by charging 6 per cent interest upon the tax assessed, if not paid within six months from the death of the decedent; while section 7210, Revised Statutes of 1908, allows one year in which to file claims before the final settlement of an estate.

This should be amended. As an inducement to executors and administrators to have estates appraised early for the determination of the inheritance tax due, the discount of 5 per cent, if paid before the expiration of six months, should be allowed.

Under section 5559, Revised Statutes of 1908, amended (Session Laws of 1909, page 462, section 29), this department has acted upon 314 applications for waivers from non-resident holders of Colorado securities under the transfer provision of this act, eighty-eight of which were found to be taxable, and from which the state received \$29,450.23.

This tax passed through the hands of the county treasurer of Denver County, and from which he has collected commissions of approximately \$600, for which there is no good reason. This money should be paid direct to the state treasurer.

Some provision should be made to have the inheritance tax paid direct to the state treasurer, thereby saving a sum sufficient to pay practically the entire expense of conducting the department.

The amount deducted by county treasurers for commissions during this biennial period is in excess of \$8,000.

Provision is made under section 5565, Revised Statutes of 1908, that county treasurers notify the district attorney of any tax due and unpaid, and the district attorney shall prosecute the proceeding in the County Court in the proper county.

This section should be amended, giving this power to the

attorney general.

Section 5566, Revised Statutes of 1908, provides that the county judge shall make a statement every three mouths to the county treasurers of the property from which, or party from whom, he has reason to believe a tax due and unpaid.

I would recommend, in this connection, that the clerk of the County Court notify the attorney general (on blanks furnished by the attorney general for that purpose) of every estate filed for probate. In this manner the inheritance tax, if any, could be

determined and, if not taxable, a waiver issued.

In this way every estate passing through the probate court is passed uopn with reference to the inheritance tax, and thus a further protection is given to devisees and distributees, as the title is thereby cleared to all realty upon the issnance of waiver.

There being considerable time consumed in passing upon all applications for waivers in ascertaining values, etc., it would not

be unjust to fix a small fee for all waivers issued.

I would suggest that waivers for the transfer of stocks, bonds, etc., be issued upon the payment of \$5 for each. On all domestic waivers, where the estate exceeds \$10,000, the fee should be \$2 for each waiver, and for all other estates \$1.

I trust the above suggestions will be given due consideration.

To The Honorable State Treasurer Roady Kenehan:

REPORT OF THE LICENSE DEPARTMENT.

For the Period of 1911 and 1912.

There seems to be a disposition on the part of some liquor dealers to avoid paying the state tax or to be given an indefinite time to pay the same.

One of the greatest difficulties the inspectors have to contend with is to get a case into court, as a case of this nature is entirely in the hands of the district attorneys, therefore, it is a slow process of collection, when they do not want to pay the tax. When a case has been brought into court the inspector has never failed to be able to furnish the necessary proof to convict the guilty persons. We, therefore, recommend a more direct manner of prosecution.

We have endeavored to collect a license from druggists doing business in local option or dry territory. They have refused to pay a state license, in some instances, therefore, it became necessary to make a test case of this part of the Revenue Law; Mr. Clayton, a druggist, doing business in Denver, took the case to the District Court; the court upheld the law and the Supreme Court of Colorado upheld the decision of the lower court.

The collection of these licenses has increased the receipts of

the department materially.

The amendment covering the fee of \$2.50 for the transfer of a liquor license from one party to another has been of great benefit

to this department.

Through the close observance of the inspectors, while in the different cities and towns of the State, we have received numerous transfer fees that would not otherwise have been paid. The transfer law has enabled the clerk to keep a more complete record of the different parties going out of business.

The United States Government has a better opportunity of collecting their license tax, owing to the United States law governing licenses, which places a penalty of 50% increase on the license if not paid at the time of expiration. This enables the United States inspectors to collect licenses more promptly than state inspectors, as in some cases they have many difficulties to contend with.

The receipts of the department have been increased far in excess of any other period, since the adoption of the local option law in this State. I give as a reason for this increase the efficient standard of the license inspectors and the faithful performance of their duties.

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE

Denver, Colorado, December 30, 1912.

Honorable Roady Kenehan, State Treasurer, Denver, Colorado.

DEAR SIR: In response to your request with reference to the proceedings relating to the payment of the State Liquor License as provided by Chapter 166 of the Session Laws of 1911, page 499, I beg leave to say that a question arose under this act as to whether or not such a State Liquor License was required of drug stores operating in anti-saloon territory and selling liquor only upon prescription and for medicinal purposes.

It was contended by the Druggists' Association that those drug stores operating in anti-saloon territory and selling liquor only upon the prescription of a physician and for medicinal pur-

poses were immune from the payment of this tax.

Soon after the passage of the law you requested an opinion upon this point and we advised you that all druggists who sold liquor, irrespective of their location, or for what purposes the liquor was sold, were subject to the tax.

A druggist in Denver named Clayton refused to pay the tax, and it was agreed that proceedings should be brought against him which should be a test case. Suit was accordingly brought in the District Court of Denver county, where a decision was rendered in favor of the contention of this office.

From the District Court Mr. Clayton took the case to our Supreme Court and this office represented the People in that court. We had the case advanced upon the docket and heard immediately upon submitted briefs and oral arguments. A decision was handed down which is now reported under the name of The People vs. Clayton, in 123 Pac. Rep., 662, in which it was held by the unanimons decision of the court, that under the act above referred to, pharmacists desiring to make sales of liquor even for medicinal purposes and on prescriptions, in anti-saloon territory, must procure a State license.

Thus the question has been definitely set at rest and there can be no further contention in the future as to the liability of all parties who sell liquor to procure a State Liquor License.



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
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
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
