To His Excellency, OLIVER H. SHOUP, Governor of Colorado.

Sir:

I have the honor to submit to you herewith my report of the business transactions of the Treasury Department of the State of Colorado for the biennial period beginning December 1, 1918, and ending November 30, 1920.

WARRANTS AND CERTIFICATES OF INDEBTEDNESS

The people of Colorado have reason to be proud of the financial condition of the state. Our credit is 100%.

During this biennial period, the Treasurer has been able to dispose of its certificates of indebtedness amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars, bearing four per cent interest at par. These have been issued to cover emergencies. At practically the same time we disposed of these securities, I purchased Liberty Bonds bearing four and one-quarter per cent, at less than 85c on the dollar.

The state has outstanding, \$1,066,374.70 in warrants and \$79,660.19 in certificates of indebtedness, all of which will be paid before June 1, 1921.

BONDED INDEBTEDNESS

The bonded indebtedness of the state is \$4,187,300.00. This is \$264,500.00 less than November 30, 1918. I furnish you herewith a tabulated statement of the same which shows but \$418,200.00 as being held by the public. The balance is held in various state investment funds.

NATIONAL DEFENSE BONDS

The Twenty-first General Assembly authorized an issue of \$2,500,000.00, known as National Defense Bonds, for the purpose of paying expenses of the state incurred in the war with Germany and maintaining law and order in the state during the years 1917 and 1918. This authorization was extended by the Twenty-second General Assembly to the years 1919 and 1920. There has been issued \$1,015,000.00; \$500,000.00 of these have been retired or paid, leaving a balance of \$515,000.00 in the State Investment Fund.

Permit me to suggest the advisability of the Twenty-third General Assembly providing an extension of this authorization to the years 1921 and 1922, to pay outstanding certificates as well as any emergency expenses that might arise within the scope of the original law pertaining to the same.

RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS, INCLUDING TRANSFERS

It will be noticed that the volume of business of the state has greatly increased during the past two years in comparison to that of any like period.

The total receipts, including transfers, during the period, amounts to \$31,248,058.03 and the disbursements \$28,973,531.17. All of this business has been handled with six assistants. The earnings of the office by way of interest during the period is \$763,-220.08, of which \$157,781.76 was collected from bank deposits. This is by far a greater amount collected than in any former biennial period.

The balance in the Treasury at the close of business November 30, 1920, is \$10,365.331.05, of which there was \$2,095,373.34 on deposit in 271 banks, \$26,119.91 cash in the office and \$8,243,837.80 in bonds and other securities. I might add, that all banks have furnished me with surety bonds, the same being 20% in excess of their deposits.

FARM LOANS

On November 30, 1918, the amount of farm loans made by the State Board of Land Commissioners was \$74,800.00. During the past two years, this was increased in the sum of \$357,450.00, totaling \$432,250.00. Of this there has been taken up \$21,700.00, leaving a balance of \$410,550.00.

PUBLIC SCHOOL PERMANENT FUND, CONTROLLED BY THE STATE BOARD OF LAND COMMISSIONERS

On November 30, 1918, this fund amounted to \$4,948,492.23, of which there was \$416,165.72 in eash uninvested. At the close of this biennial period there is \$6,507,574.12, of which there is but

\$44,071.74 in cash. The fund has increased \$1,559,081.89.

It has been the practice to clip coupons from bonds before delivering the same to this office for payment. This is done for the purpose of bringing the interest yield to the state to a basis as agreed upon through the purchase of the bonds. Under the law as it now exists, the Treasurer has no control over these investments, other than to pay when so directed.

STATE COMPENSATION INSURANCE FUND

On December 1, 1918, this fund had a balance of \$564,542.45. The receipts for the two years were \$714,759.43, totaling \$1,279,-301.88. There has been disbursed the sum of \$278,868.88, leaving a balance of \$1,000,433.00, practically all of which is invested in interest bearing securities.

INHERITANCE TAX DEPARTMENT

This department collected the sum of \$1,294,305.81 during the two years. This is the largest amount of revenue derived from the department during any former biennial period. The expenses of the department for salaries, etc., amounted to \$40,330.76. The collections do not include other large amounts yet uncollected belonging to this biennial period. The department is deserving of credit for the splendid manner in which the business of the office has been conducted by those in charge.

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

The receipts of this department amount to \$824,044.73; \$109,-412.45 was transferred to the Firemen's Pension Fund. The expenses of the department were \$66,798.10. This is the best showing ever made by this department.

STATE ROAD FUND.

On November 30, 1918, there was to the credit of this fund \$165,711.54. The receipts of the fund during the past two years amounted to \$4,891,459.18, making a total of \$5,057,170.72. The disbursements amounted to \$4,956,148.85, leaving a balance of \$101,021.87. At this time there is on file in the Auditor's office bills allowed by the Highway Commission far in excess of the balance stated above.

. NEW OFFICE BUILDING

The revenue authorized by the Twenty-second General Assembly by way of 12/100 of a mill tax levy for each of the years 1919, 1920 and 1921, I estimate at \$550,000.00. There have been warrants issued to the extent of \$443,568.41. In order to complete the building, it will require an extension of the levy to cover at least \$750,000.00 more.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' VOCATIONAL LOAN FUND

The Twenty-second General Assembly appropriated the sum of \$200,000.00 for the purpose of loaning to honorably discharged soldiers and sailors to assist them in obtaining a vocational training. More than one thousand soldiers and sailors have benefited thereby, the maximum amount to each being \$200.00. These loans were made for a period of five years, taking the individual's unsecured note with interest beginning three years after date of the same. But seventy-five dollars remained in the appropriation at the close of the fiscal year.

The Loan Board was composed of the Governor, Superintendent of Public Instruction and State Treasurer, Mr. J. E. Morehead being elected secretary. Much credit is due to officers of American Legion posts for their assistance in passing upon the applications.

PUBLIC SCHOOL INCOME FUND

Upon entering upon my duties as Treasurer I found the sum of \$600,900.00 in this fund by way of bonds invested in the same. This money, under the law, should have been apportioned to the counties for school purposes long since, the distribution being made per capita from the school census. We have disbursed \$50,900.00 of this to the schools during this administration. During the past year we have paid to the counties \$823,000.00 for school purposes. This fund should not be used for investment purposes.

DELINQUENT COLLECTIONS

We have collected \$15,000.00 through the Attorney General's office for forfeited bonds in criminal cases, and approximately the same amount for interest from counties which for many years have refused to pay over the same.

OVER-ISSUES OF BONDS

Upon taking charge of the Treasurer's office in January, 1919, we found \$1,000,000.00 of state bonds which had been issued in excess of the authorization. These were destroyed by me by authority of a joint Senate and House resolution of the Twenty-second General Assembly. These bonds I found to have been signed by the then state officers and the great seal of the state placed thereon.

INTEREST PAID

We have paid only \$14,695.14 interest on state warrants, the smallest amount ever paid. This because of the fact that the state has been on a cash basis a great part of the period. \$300,555.19 was paid as interest on state bonds.

I would be ungrateful if I did not express herein my appreciation of the splendid assistance rendered checrfully at all times by

my deputy, Mr. J. S. Temple, and the whole office force.
