History

The **University of Colorado** plays a profound role in the lives of individuals, businesses and communities throughout Colorado, across the country and around the world. Nearly a half million alumni are leaders in business, science, the arts, health care and their communities, and they're joined by some 16,000 more each year. In Aurora, Boulder, Colorado Springs and Denver, all four campuses are all for Colorado.

#### CU Boulder, 1876

CU Boulder is all about furthering the public good through the positive impacts of new knowledge. From offering dozens of exciting programs in a range of academic fields, to serving as one of the world's leading research and innovation hubs, to working closely through hundreds of public outreach efforts across Colorado and the world. CU Boulder takes pride in helping turn new ideas into positive outcomes.

#### CU Colorado Springs, 1965

CU Colorado Springs is a residential academic and research mainstay in southern Colorado, partnering with major corporations and federal agencies to provide leading-edge education in areas including cybersecurity, business, engineering, arts and health care.

#### CU Denver, 1973

As Colorado's public urban research university, CU Denver is a vital contributor to the economic and social fabric of Denver and the state through education, innovative partnerships and public service. Recognized disciplines include architecture, digital media, engineering, health professions and public administration.

### **CU Anschutz Medical Campus, 2006** (School of Medicine established in 1883 in Boulder)

The CU Anschutz Medical Campus is at the forefront of transformative science, medicine, education and patient care. The campus encompasses the University of Colorado health professional schools, more than 60 centers and institutes and two nationally ranked hospitals that treat some 2 million adult and pediatric patients each year.

# University of Colorado | Quick Facts

- CU has more than 67,000 degree-seeking students and an additional 8,000 taking courses for credit.
- More than 250,000 alumni live and work in Colorado. There are some 490,000 CU alumni worldwide.
- CU researchers received more than \$1.2 billion in sponsored research funding in FY 2018-19 to advance knowledge, create businesses and foster discovery and innovation.
- CU and its affiliate hospitals generate an
   economic impact of \$12.35 billion annually
   for the state. This does not include the economic
   impact of CU alumni in Colorado.
- University-wide, awards to students for academic excellence include 5 Marshall Scholarships,
   20 Rhodes Scholars, 8 Truman Scholarships, 7 Goldwater Scholarships and 3 Udall Scholarships.

- **CU ingenuity** has fostered **190 startups** in the past 25 years.
- Five Nobel Laureates: David J. Wineland, physics, 2012; John Hall, physics, 2005; Eric Cornell and Carl Wieman, physics, 2001; Thomas Cech, chemistry, 1989
- Other outstanding faculty include: 10 MacArthur "genius" fellows and two Carnegie Foundation's Professor of the Year honorees
- The University of Colorado has 19 alumni astronauts and one teaching astronaut.
- CU is the third-largest employer in the state, employing a workforce of more than 37,000.
- CU South Denver delivers market-responsive education and expertise in the Lone Tree area.

**Advancing CU:** The University of Colorado launched the Essential CU philanthropic campaign in January 2019 to amplify donors' passions and advance CU's academic, research and public service priorities. The campaign, which seeks \$4 billion in support, inspires donors to partner with CU to expand opportunities for students, unearth new discoveries, attract top talent and transform health care.

Since the conclusion of CU's previous campaign in 2013, donors have committed more than \$2.3 billion in gifts. More than 200,000 donors have made nearly 375,000 gifts during Essential CU through the end of fiscal year 2019.



Mark Kennedy became the 23rd president of the University of Colorado in July 2019. He oversees a university system with four campuses (Boulder, Colorado Springs, Denver and the Anschutz Medical Campus), some 67,000 students, 37,000 employees and a \$4.8 billion annual budget.

Kennedy had successful careers in business, government and higher education before coming to Colorado. He played leadership roles at Pillsbury and the company known today as Macy's. He was a three-term U.S. congressman from Minnesota. Kennedy taught at prestigious universities in the U.S. and abroad, directed the Graduate School of Public Management at George Washington University and was president of the University of North Dakota.

His focus at CU is developing and implementing a strategic plan to help the university meet the challenges posed by rapidly changing technology, demographics and threats to public funding.

He earned a bachelor's degree from St. John's University and a master's in business administration with distinction from the University of Michigan.
