

Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC)

The University of Colorado administers ROTC programs for the Air Force, Army, and Navy/Marine Corps in collaboration with the United States military, and also with other Colorado postsecondary institutions. According to <u>USA.gov</u>, "The Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) program, is a college-based, officer commissioning program which produces officers for all branches of the U.S. armed forces, except the U.S. Coast Guard. The ROTC also offers merit-based scholarships, in many cases paying for the full tuition of college. All ROTC graduates have a military service obligation."

CU Student Opportunities

Every ROTC branch in the CU System and state of Colorado has a different organizational structure. Air Force ROTC is facilitated by CU-Boulder as a host campus for participating colleges and universities; students throughout the CU system who are admitted by the Air Force ROTC are eligible for membership. CU-Boulder is the sole host of a Navy/Marine Corps ROTC; the program is also offered to eligible CU Denver | Anschutz Medical Campus students. Both CU-Boulder and UCCS host Army ROTC. In February 2013, the CU-Boulder Army ROTC program was ranked among the nation's top 8 units. Eligible CU Denver students can participate in the Army ROTC with one of the following institutions: Colorado School of Mines, Metropolitan State University of Denver (program administrator of CU-Boulder's satellite ROTC program for the Auraria campus), or via concurrent enrollment with CU-Boulder.

CU-Boulder ROTC students can apply credits towards an undergraduate degree and/or certificate program with an ROTC degree plan. Students are provided with a course plan that allows structure for degree attainment in four academic years. ROTC program participants can earn a certificate in the Study and Practice of Leadership with completion of required coursework (ROTC along with leadership-based courses), satisfaction of GPA requirements (3.0+), and a summer field training program.

UCCS coordinates Army ROTC for its students as well as for others attending institutions in southern Colorado. UCCS ROTC students can apply ROTC course credit toward degree requirements. Those who satisfy an 18 credit hour

program, which mainly consists of upper-level leadership-based courses, earn a Military Science minor. As of Academic Year 2014, the sole Army ROTC nursing program in Colorado is offered by UCCS and its affiliate, Colorado State University-Pueblo. Scholarships are available for eligible members of the undergraduate and graduate ROTC nursing cohort.

CU Denver | Anschutz Medical Campus does not host an ROTC program; however, eligible students have access to the Auraria campus Army ROTC program administered by Metropolitan State University of Denver or with other institutions' programming outlined above.
