University of Colorado at Boulder Pre-Collegiate Development Program Overview

The Pre-Collegiate Development Program (PCDP) at the University of Colorado at Boulder is an institutionally funded academic enhancement program for targeted middle and high school students and is currently entering its 27th year of operation on the Boulder campus. This highly successful program is the cornerstone of the Office of Pre-College Outreach and Engagement and the model upon which it was developed has been effectively duplicated in other outreach efforts conducted by the University of Colorado in communities across the state. PCDP is designed to prepare and motivate first generation students in their goal of pursuing a postsecondary education. Program activities and offerings are structured to enhance the participants' exposure to academic and personal resources which will enable students to become academically and socially prepared to enroll and achieve success at the University of Colorado at Boulder or any choice postsecondary institution. In addition, participating parents are provided with the information and resources to better understand the educational system in which their children are participating. Special support activities are provided to assist the parents in understanding the different transitions and transformations that occur, as the students move from one level to another (i.e., elementary to secondary to postsecondary).

Purpose/Goals of the PCDP Program

- Provide academic enhancement strategies and opportunities;
- Facilitate college/career exploration opportunities;
- Provide leadership development opportunities for both students and parents;
- Establish collaborative networks among parents, school personnel (Directors, Counselors, Coaches, Principals) and community; and,
- Provide parents with tools/information to assist their students in achieving their educational goals.

PCDP Program Benefits

- Opportunities for students to acquire better academic and study skills;
- Students are provided with tools to improve interpersonal and leadership skills;
- Students are provided strategic insight and assistance in preparing for the ACT exam;
- College-prep advising based on CU-Boulder's Minimum Academic Preparation Standards (MAPS);
- Staff reviews student academic progress on a semester-by-semester basis;
- Assistance with the college transition process including help with:
 - Completion of college applications;
 - Completion of Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA); and,
 - Strengthening admission and scholarship essays;
- Academic Summer Residential Program provided for rising high school seniors;
- Summer college courses (English and Journalism) for eligible students;
- Scholarships for students who complete the summer residential program, enroll at CU- Boulder and participate in a LEAD Alliance Program;
- Referrals to community and campus resources;
- Development of support groups for both students and parents via community building academies and activities; and,
- Cost free service to both students/parents.

Eligibility Requirements

- Attend a target high school or middle school;
- Be a potential first generation college student (parents have not earned a four-year college degree);
- Minimum of 2.5 Grade Point Average in middle school and must have a 2.75 GPA to transition to and continue participating in the high school program;
- Parents must attend Saturday Academies along with their students as program participants/partners;
- Recruited students may also meet one of the following criteria:
 - member of a single-parent family,
 - eldest child in the family and/or,
 - have a strong desire to pursue higher education.

CU-Boulder PCDP Summer Residential Program

The Pre-Collegiate Development Program provides its rising seniors with an intensely academically focused Summer Residential Program on the CU-Boulder campus. In addition to providing academic enhancement opportunities, the summer residential program exposes the students to college life by providing them an opportunity to live in the residence halls, access to classroom and laboratory resources and, interaction with university faculty and staff. The PCDP students are registered in the following content areas: Mathematics (College Algebra I and II, Trigonometry, Pre-Calculus, Calculus); Expository Writing (for college and non-college credit), Journalism (for college credit); College Prep Seminar; and Leadership Course. The students are also offered one elective class in the following courses: Engineering, Robotics and Web Design.

During the Summer Residential Program, the students will meet with CU Admissions and Financial Aid Representatives to discuss and gain insight into the many academic and financial intricacies of transitioning to university life. PCDP, along with its partners, offers extensive academic advising, tutoring, and academic enrichment activities to its student participants, in order to encourage and support them in succeeding academically and preparing themselves to successfully gain admission to CU-Boulder or another choice university.

Students are awarded letter grades (A – F) in their summer courses; the transcripts are sent to the students' high school registrars for placement on the students' high school transcript. Some target high schools award elective credit to PCDP students who complete the summer program.

Over one-half of the 2009 Pre-Collegiate Summer Residential class, was admitted to the University of Colorado Boulder at the end of the Summer Residential Program on July 2, 2009.

Summit County Pre-Collegiate Program

CU-Boulder has recently initiated a program in Summit County to expand the reach of the pre-collegiate programs. The Pre-Collegiate Program of Summit County is a partnership between the Summit County School District, The Summit Foundation, the University of Colorado, Boulder and Colorado Mountain College. The program was originally designed to assist the Summit County School District in addressing the low graduation rates among Latino students in the district but has since been expanded to include all first generation and low-income students in the district.

Through this partnership Summit County families and students will be the recipients of the mentoring and the resources needed to find the motivation to graduate from high school and to continue on to a successful post-high school experience. And, this kind of partnership sends a sincere message of the collaboration it takes on the part of a community to close the achievement gap and to provide all students with hope for their futures.

The primary goal of the Summit County Pre-Collegiate Program is to adequately prepare identified students for a professional, college career by exposing them to specific areas of interest; complemented with the essential academic advising of high school course selections (in cooperation with their parents, guidance counselors and mentors) to meet that desired objective. In addition, during the academic year, the students and their parents are afforded relevant Saturday Academies in College Readiness and Interpersonal Skills Development. Tutoring services are also provided on an ongoing basis during the academic year at their high school.

Further, participants at the high school level are provided with either a one or two-week, intensive, academic Summer Residential Program. The students experience living on campus, while being exposed to academic courses designed to augment their requirements (e.g., mathematics, writing, sciences, research, etc.) upon their return to their host high schools. The one-week is hosted by Colorado Mountain College for high school freshmen and sophomores and the two-week program is hosted by the University of Colorado, Boulder for the juniors and seniors.

The Program is currently serving approximately 60 students from grades 7 through 12 in its pilot year. The program is staffed by one full-time professional program coordinator and supported by staff in both the middle and high school.

Future plans for PCDP include the following:

- Academic Year Saturday Academies; collaborate with other University of Colorado system PCDP Programs to offer cooperative programming to students; e.g., College Fair at UCD, etc.
- Recruitment at the middle and high school level.
- Explore the potential recruitment of a limited number of students from independent schools.
- Offer an anatomy course during the 2010 Summer Residential Program.
- Offer a business course during the 2010 Summer Residential Program.
- Offer a computer programming course during the 2010 Summer Residential Program.
- Reinstigate program's Summer Service Learning Component.
- Utilize summer instructors as workshop presenters during the academic year.
- Reinstigate PCDP System Directors' Meetings.

University of Colorado Denver Pre-Collegiate Development Program Overview

Mission Statement

The purpose of the University of Colorado Denver's Pre-Collegiate Development Program is to:

- provide high quality services to potential and current students;
- motivate and prepare first-generation college bound students to complete high school on a timely basis and enter post-secondary institutions with the necessary academic skills to graduate and complete a professional degree by supplementing secondary academic curriculum; and
- guide and provide services that assist students to transfer to the University with the appropriate academic requirements.

Selection Criteria

- Must attend a target high school or middle school
- Be a potential first generation college student (neither parent has a 4-year college degree)
- Minimum 2.50 Grade Point Average
- Meet one or more of the following requirements: (a) be a member of a one-parent family, (b) be the eldest child in the family, or (c) have a strong desire to continue onto higher education

Pre-Collegiate Middle School Academic Program

The Pre-Collegiate Middle School Academic Program (PCMSAP) at the University of Colorado Denver, Denver Campus is an academic enhancement program. This program is designed to adequately prepare potential first-generation (neither of whose natural or adoptive parent(s) received a baccalaureate degree) college students in grades seven and eight to successfully complete their pre-secondary school career, then enroll in a college preparatory high school curriculum. The ultimate goal is that they enroll in a college/university of their choice with the necessary skills and academic preparation to succeed at and graduate from that institution.

The Pre-Collegiate Middle School Academic Program serves as a precursor to the Pre-Collegiate Development Program (high school). Students who successfully complete the Pre-Collegiate Middle School Academic Program with a cumulative G.P.A. of 2.75 or better will then be admitted to the Pre-Collegiate Development Program at the end of their 8th grade year.

The Program will offer students the opportunity to engage in a wide range of Pre-Collegiate activities throughout the academic year. The academic year component will offer students monthly Saturday Academies consisting of basic study skills (e.g., effective note taking, time management, effective listening, organization, etc.), supplemental academic instruction, communication skills development, career exploration day, high school transition preparation, parent partnership workshops and a variety of cultural enrichment experiences.

Pre-Collegiate Development High School Program

The Pre-Collegiate Development Program, sponsored by the University of Colorado Denver, Denver Campus, is an institutionally funded academic enhancement program for high school students. This program has been in existence on the Denver campus since January 1988. The program's objective is to motivate and prepare first-generation students (grades 9 through 12) who attend sixteen Denver metro-area high schools, to successfully complete high school on a timely basis and develop the necessary skills, then successfully enter and graduate from their choice post-secondary institution.

The Pre-Collegiate Development Program is designed to increase the number of first-generation secondary students who aspire to attain a post-secondary education. This is achieved by providing essential and timely academic advising, in cooperation with parents and high school guidance counselors, to assure a timely graduation and meet the students' desired successful admission to their choice college/university.

During the academic year students are provided with relevant Saturday Academies in such areas as: Basic Study Skills Mastery, College Entrance Exam Preparation, and Student Communications Workshops. Tutoring services are also provided on an ongoing basis throughout the academic year both at UCD and the student's high school.

In addition, these students are provided with either a two-week (sophomores) or five-week (juniors) intense Summer Academic Program. During this experience, students are exposed to various academic courses, which are designed to enhance and augment their college entry requirements (e.g., mathematics, writing, and the sciences) once they return to their host high school for either their junior or senior year. Students and their parents are clearly informed that there is a major difference.

Pre-Collegiate Health Careers Program

The Pre-Collegiate Health Careers Program (PCHCP) at the University of Colorado Denver Anschutz Medical Campus (AMC), is an academic, enrichment and support program designed to motivate first-generation college students (neither of whose natural or adoptive parent(s) received a baccalaureate degree) to graduate from high school successfully, complete a college preparatory curriculum, and pursue a college education leading to a career in a health care profession.

PCHCP offers students in grades 10 through 12 the opportunity to engage in a wide range of pre-college activities throughout the academic year. The academic year component provides students monthly Saturday Academies consisting of health career, study skills, academic and financial aid workshops.

Sophomores prior to the junior year participate in a two-week introductory academic program at the Anschutz Medical Campus. The two-week academic program includes a college preparation seminar, as well as sessions on health careers, creative writing, human anatomy, mathematics (Pre-Algebra, Pre-Calculus) and health disparities.

In addition, a five-week summer program for juniors prior to the senior year will be held on the Anschutz Medical Campus. This session consists of accelerated high school mathematics (Alg. 1-Calculus) and human anatomy classes, a three-credit English composition college course, along with cultural, social and recreational activities.

Accomplishment Highlights

- Successful implementation of the consolidation of the Health Careers Program;
- Successful recruitment of high school freshmen for the Health Careers Program;
- Successful expansion into new target high schools for the Health Careers Program;
- Successful expansion new target middle schools;
- Successful placement of 2009 high school graduates;
- Successful implementation of a college credit granting Arts and Media course;
- Successful implementation of a college credit granting Urban Education course.

Future Plans

- Implementation of Middle School two week summer program;
- Implementation of college credit granting Education course;
- Reassess and develop a comprehensive series of Saturday Academy workshops.

Mission Statement

To provide academic and financial support to middle and high school students who would be the first generation in their families to graduate from college.

Program Description

The Roaring Fork School District Pre-Collegiate Program is an academic enrichment and support program designed to guide academically motivated middle and high school students and their parents to successfully complete high school and matriculate to a postsecondary institution with the necessary academic and interpersonal skills needed to succeed and graduate. The program guides parents on how to plan financially for college and how and where to apply for support. It is a partnership between the Roaring Fork School District, the University of Colorado at Boulder and the Colorado Mountain College.

The program consists of three components: Mentor Program; Saturday Academies and Summer Academic Camps.

The mentor program is a yearlong series of meetings that occur during the school day. Mentors are professionals from the community who know the importance of giving their time to positively influence young lives. The curriculum for these meetings include life-skills, current events, community service, ACT preparation, goal setting, field trips and guest speakers.

Saturday Academies cover study skills, communication skills, college entrance preparation, career exploration, college fair visits, ACT preparation, etc. The Summer Academic Camps consist of a one-week residential program hosted at Colorado Mountain College for freshman and sophomores, and a two-week program at the University of Colorado at Boulder for juniors and seniors. During these programs, students experience living on campus while being exposed to the rigor of academic courses designed to augment requirements in math, writing and science.

The Roaring Fork Pre-Collegiate Program has a full-time director and a part-time administrative assistant as well as 22 volunteer mentors. An advisory board oversees the program. The program provides services to over 200 7th to 12th grade students from the Roaring Fork Valley. The program has been successful in the placement of its graduating seniors into higher education at a rate of 95% or above. All seniors enrolled in the program have graduated from high school.

The Aspen Community Foundation provided the initial start up funding and has continued to support the program through grants, donor advised funds and scholarships.

Student Eligibility

Students are selected to participate in the program based on the following criteria:

- Roaring Fork School District middle or high school student
- Student would be a first-generation college graduate in their family - neither parent received a baccalaureate degree (some exceptions apply to this rule);
- Minimum of a 2.75 grade point average
- Be academically motivated

In addition, the student could meet one or more of the following requirements:

- Come from a single-parent family
- Be the eldest sibling in the family, or
- Have a desire to continue her/his education beyond high school
