

Mission Statement

The University of Colorado Museum promotes excellence in research in the natural sciences and anthropology, provides academic training for graduate students in the Museum and Field Studies Graduate Program, and provides extra-classroom educational opportunities to CU students, faculty and the general public through educational programming.

Priorities

The Museum's priorities are to support and encourage excellence in scholarly research in natural history and anthropology, to provide an archive of objects of natural and cultural history for the world-wide community of scholarship; to provide excellent graduate training in museum and field studies, and to provide broad access to our resources to the citizens of Colorado.

Accomplishments

The University of Colorado Museum was awarded interim accreditation by the American Association of Museums in August, 2002, and began preparations for the accreditation committee visiting team's review that occurred in April 2003. Throughout the Museum's Centennial Year, curators and staff participated in a series of monthly public lectures highlighting the history of Museum collections and current research. Dr. Jaelyn Eberle joined the Museum as Curator of Vertebrate Paleontology and the Department of Geological Sciences as Assistant Professor. On February 14, 2002, Tara Hess, the Museum's database/web manager and informatics specialist launched the Museum's new web site, http://cumuseum.colorado.edu, which has quickly become an invaluable resource for our constituents as well as for us. The Museum's informatics initiatives included the Botany and Zoology Sections participating in an NSF collaborative research project proposal, "Linked Databases and Interactive Key for the Vascular Flora of Colorado," and the Zoology section completing geocoding and electronically databasing all invertebrate and vertebrate collections. An endowment, "Research in Southwestern Anthropology," was established in the Anthropology Section. The Museum and Field Studies program admitted ten graduate students and two certificate students. Seven Museum and Field Studies students were awarded Masters of Science degrees. Ms. Karen Hebbel joined the Museum staff as Assistant to the Director.

Section Highlights

Museum & Field Studies Graduate Program

The Program received 36 applicants from all regions of the U.S. and one foreign country. Ten graduate students (average GPA 3.56) and two certificate students (average GPA 3.77) were admitted to the Program for academic year 2002-2003.

During the past fiscal year seven students were awarded M.S. degrees.

Students received \$283,828 in financial support through the M&FS Program and the Museum in the form of stipends, tuition remission, graduate appointment salary, and research scholarships and fellowships.

Public Section

The Museum received the 2003 Service Recognition Award from the Chancellor's Committee on Minority Affairs for its efforts in reaching underserved populations.

Twenty-five public programs were offered to the community.


Education Coordinator Jim Hakala instituted workshops as an enhancement to K-12 tours. 18 workshops were attended by 352 students.


