When CSU Global was founded in 2007, our unique mission of serving working adults through bachelor's degree completion and master's degree programs initially excluded first-time, first-year freshmen who had never earned college credits.

As the needs and goals of students in all age groups have evolved, we worked with the State of Colorado to pass Senate Bill 14-114 (in 2014) and Senate Bill 18-101 (in 2018), allowing CSU Global to admit out-of-state and in-state freshmen without transfer credits, respectively.





n 2013, Jason Hotch was working at a small community college in California, anxiously awaiting the birth of his first child, when he remembered a promise he made to his late grandmother: that he'd graduate from college, making him the first in his family to do so.

Hotch knew his incomplete education was holding him back. "I already had a good job, but to move forward, I was going to need the credentials."

While working as a program assistant at Copper Mountain College in California, Hotch heard about an internal position that had opened up. He wanted to apply, but the job required a Bachelor's Degree. Hotch said he spoke with the HR director, who said, "I have no doubt that you can do it, but you're not going to get past stage one [the requirement to apply was a bachelor's degree]."

"That one kind of stung," says Hotch. But even so, it served a purpose in showing him how much his lack of education was impacting his life

The race was on to find a flexible, affordable way to finish his bachelor's degree. "I think the wife may have found [CSU Global]," says Hotch. Once in touch with a CSU Global enrollment counselor, it wasn't long until Hotch started classes – and in 2015, he proudly graduated with a B.S. in Business Management.

Today, Hotch is a fiscal development officer for the University of Alaska - Anchorage, the state's largest postsecondary education

institution. "I'm our main point of contact for the College of Engineering for purchasing, procurement, grants, and contracts. I also manage our foundation money, and am the point of contact between the foundation, which serves the University of Alaska as a whole, the three main campuses, and all the satellite campuses." "[My CSU Global degree] absolutely led to this job," says Hotch.

Hotch says that one of the things he most appreciated about CSU Global was the expert faculty. "The diversity and qualifications of the faculty members that I had -- I feel I really lucked out. The realworld experience that the faculty brought to the table was massively helpful." Hotch said that being able to ask faculty if certain strategies or concepts had been applicable in their professional experience was instrumental in his education.

Now with two young, bright, and curious daughters looking up to him, Hotch hopes to serve as an example that college is attainable, if or when they choose to go. "It's become the norm to talk about higher education. Their college savings are growing, so we're planning on it."

As a student speaker at the 2015 CSU Global Commencement ceremony, Hotch inspired his fellow graduates: "We have attained something that can never be taken from us. It's helped us expand not only our knowledge, but helped us grow as individuals. That is something truly amazing and worthy of celebration."





Alumni Income Trends by Graduation Year - Bachelor's Degrees




Bachelor's Learning Outcome Assessment










One year after earning their degrees, CSU Global Graduates earn more on average than the median incomes in their career fields.

.S. Air Force reservist Rose Smith is not one to sit around and wait for things to happen. "I hate being stagnate!" she says. So it's no surprise that, while completing her USAF training, she was already considering what her future might hold.

"After talking with my shop supervisor about different opportunities, I learned about the Medical Service Corps. I've always wanted to be a leader, and because I'm already in healthcare, it seemed like a good path to continue on."

Smith knew she'd need a bachelor's degree to support her experience as a biomedical equipment technician, so she immediately started looking at schools -- ultimately selecting CSU Global.

"I chose CSU Global because it is a very military friendly school, with the lowest cost per credit, allowing me to pay minimal tuition outof-pocket using tuition assistance," says Smith. She noted that the accelerated courses also give her some much-needed flexibility due to her unpredictable schedule.

CSU Global is fortunate to have Smith as part of our student community. She's grown into an exceptional leader, including as a member of the CSU Global Student Veteran Organization (SVO).

Smith recently graduated from the USAF Airman Leadership School (ALS) at F.E. Not only did Smith complete the ASL program, but she received the prestigious John Levitow Award -- which is presented to the school's top graduate -- as well as the Noncommissioned Officer Professional Development Ribbon, which Smith is proud to wear as part of her uniform.



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

f you're looking for Dan Edwards, head down to the river. You'll likely find him there, dressed in waders, casting flies for hours, in search of the day's great catch. Fly fishing is his hobby -- one that has evolved into a successful business.

Like many of his fellow CSU Global alumni, Edwards is a husband and father who went back to school after he had been in the workforce for several years. After working stints at a number of telecom companies, and enduring multiple layoffs, he returned to his background in construction. But when the economy took a dive in 2008, Edwards knew that he'd need a college education to get ahead.

Going back to school was a challenge, but Edwards works well under pressure. He persevered and earned his Bachelor's Degree in Business Management from CSU Global in 2012. "My oldest son was seven in 2012, so he got to see me graduate. That was very cool."

Edwards now lives in Cortez, a town in southwest Colorado, and spends his days leading an international finance-and-accounting team for NTT Global Networks.

Though an accounting professional by trade, Edwards is a fisherman at heart. "I have an entrepreneurial spirit," he says. It's that spirit, his passion for fly fishing, and the confidence that comes with education and experience that led him to create TrueFly Supply, a subscriptionbox service for fly-fishing equipment.

Edwards and his business partner, Ed Weston, have been fishing together for years, and admittedly wanted to start a fly fishing-supply business as a clever way to get free or discounted gear to support their hobby. But when they originally drew up a business plan, they were disappointed to see a huge amount of competition.

Around this time, Edwards had signed up for Dollar Shave Club, a monthly subscription of inexpensive razors. He wondered if a similar idea could be carried out with fly fishing, and began researching. There were, in fact, other fly fishing-subscription boxes, but Edwards wanted to learn more. "I subscribed to all these boxes ... and they did a really good job, but I just thought maybe we could do something a little different."

They hit the ground running, and when it didn't quite take off as they hoped, Edwards and Weston brought in a marketing professional. Focusing their message, engaging in social media, and executing on other tactics have made all the difference: TrueFly Supply now has approximately 500 members. "It's grown so fast this year, 10-fold since January," says Edwards. "It's just been phenomenal for us."

The success has also provided Edwards and his team the opportunity to give back to various groups. TrueFly Supply has donated hundreds of fishing leaders to Casting for Recovery, an organization that supports breast cancer patients and survivors. They've also partnered with conservation group Trout Unlimited on the #fillanet campaign.

"It gets fishermen to pick up trash in and around the river. We give away a loaded subscription box every month to someone that uses the hashtag on Instagram and shows us the picture of their net [full of

Edwards is quick to acknowledge that the education and credentials he's earned play a large part in having the confidence to pursue his dream. "I've written countless business cases...read legal documents, SOWs, master services agreements. All of that writing and researching ... really set me up [for success]. CSU Global was the foundation in all of my accomplishments."

ixteen years ago, if you would have told physical therapist assistant Andy Anderson that he'd eventually have his eye on a hospital's C-suite, he would have shrugged off the idea. Today, a seat at the boardroom table is well within reach.

The CSU Global student is currently working toward his Master's Degree in Healthcare Administration and Management while working full-time for the Door County (Wisconsin) Medical Center's Rehab Services.

Anderson spent nearly 17 years as a physical therapist assistant and a documentation assistant – both jobs he enjoyed. But when considering his long-term goals, he says,

"I knew that more education just gave me more options." With his director likely retiring in the next five to 10 years, Anderson is positioning himself to be considered as her replacement. "I've already approached my organization and started talking about a succession plan for her," says Anderson. "[Pursuing my master's] opened the door to show my commitment to the organization, but also to my own professional development."


Anderson was recently promoted to rehab supervisor, with the full support of his director. "She's taken me under her wing, really teaching me the ropes and giving me the training that I need. She involves me in just about all of our decision-making processes, and I've been put on different committees at the hospital – from quality to core teams, to integration teams." He's also able to participate in the Door County Medical Center's leadership development institute, where supervisors meet quarterly to explore new initiatives, as well as refine leadership skills.

"Going through school has opened my eyes to how high the ceiling really is. [Being mentored for the] director position is phenomenal, that was more than I ever anticipated coming into this job 16, 17 years ago. Now I'm considering, 'Are there ways that I could get into the C-suite? Are there options for that down the road? And I think there may be as I continue."


Anderson says that his master's program has already given him a new perspective on both his work and the organization as a whole.

"Clinicians or providers can get stuck looking at just what's inside their scope – what they have to do in their day-to-day duties – and don't necessarily look at those tentacles that branch out," says Anderson. "Everything has a ripple effect as it moves up the chain."



imberly Hardy is a business owner and a doctoral candidate. What's her secret to success? Goal-setting.

At one point, Hardy's undergraduate professors impressed upon her the importance of setting personal, professional, and educational goals – realistic ones that she could achieve over the next five, 10, and 15 years. "They were meant to be flexible enough to provide some wiggle room, but specific enough that they were clear," says Hardy.

The writer and marketing professional has made significant progress when it comes to achieving those goals. Hardy, who earned her Master's Degree in Organizational Leadership from CSU Global, says, "Getting my master's opened many doors. [It] greatly refined my writing, and gave me a deeper insight into leadership, in general." In fact, Hardy has authored a number of CSU Global blog posts, including a two-part series on the importance of mentoring. "[My] CSU Global master's education played a role in everything I've accomplished."

Hardy says that when it came time to tackle her goal of earning a master's degree, choosing CSU Global was a no-brainer. "The association with the CSU System, the opportunity for high-quality professors to assess my work, and the flexibility of completing all coursework online was too great to pass up."


