Mission: To achieve stewardship of Colorado's diverse forest environments for the benefit of present and future generations.


Organization:

Structure: The Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS) is an agency of the Warner College of Natural Resources at Colorado State University and provides staffing for the Division of Forestry at the Colorado Department of Natural Resources.

Facilities: Services are provided through the State Office in Fort Collins and 19 offices throughout Colorado.

Leadership: Mike Lester, State Forester and Director Employees: 178 (96 full-time; 8 part-time; 74 seasonals)

Volunteers: 346 individuals for 2,460 hours, plus 34 youth volunteers for 545 youth hours
