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Profile

Character

Colorado State University is a land-grant institution, a spacegrant institution and a Carnegie Class I Research University. It consists of eight colleges, 56 academic departments, the Agricultural Experiment Station, Cooperative Extension and the Colorado State Forest Service.

History

Colorado State University was founded in 1870 as the Agricultural College of Colorado. The doors opened to the first students in 1879. In 1935, the school became the Colorado State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, or Colorado A & M. It became Colorado State University in 1957.

Location

Fort Collins is a midsize city of 113,000, located in Northern Colorado at the western edge of the Great Plains and the base of the Rocky Mountains.

Campus

The campuses cover 5,612 acres in Larimer County, including the 643-acre main campus (which includes 107 acres for the Veterinary Teaching Hospital), 1,730-acre foothills campus, 923-acre agricultural campus, and 1,192-acre Pingree Park mountain campus. Colorado State University has 4,030 acres of land for research centers and Colorado State Forest Service stations outside of Larimer County. There are Cooperative Extension offices in 57 Colorado counties.

The Arts

CSU presents more than 300 performances, exhibits and other art events each year; many of them free of charge. Facilities include the Hatton Gallery, the Curfman Gallery, the Music Recital Hall, the Lory Student Center Theatre and the Johnson Hall Main Stage.

Athletics

CSU is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) at the Division I level and the Mountain West Athletic Conference. The Rams field teams in 15 intercollegiate sports and athletic facilities include Hughes Stadium and Moby Arena. Team colors are green and gold.

Budget

For FY99, the total budget was \$465.5 million including an Education & General (E&G) budget of \$184.8 million. The E&G budget for FY00 is \$196.1 million.

Accreditation

CSU is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools and numerous other accrediting organizations.

Alumni

CSU has more than 131,000 living alumni.

Outreach

CSU is uniquely connected to Colorado communities via Cooperative Extension, the Colorado Agricultural Experiment Station and the Colorado State Forest Service. Cooperative Extension has offices in 57 of 63 Colorado counties and delivers research-based information and educational programs to citizens locally. The Colorado State Forest Service has 18 district offices statewide and provides information and programs on forest management, wildfire protection, community forestry and conservation education. The Agricultural Experiment Station has 10 research centers that conduct site-specific research on agriculture and related issues important to the state's social and economic well-being.

Residence Life

CSU has 10 residence halls with a capacity of about 4,500 students. There are 21 fraternities and 14 sororities, 718 apartment units for students with families and 190 apartments for older or graduate students.

Academic Year

CSU operates on the semester system with the fall semester beginning in late August and ending before Christmas. The spring semester begins in January and ends in May. There are 12 weeks in the regular summer session.

Libraries

The Morgan Library addition and renovation project was completed in the spring of 1998. Morgan Library offers both one-on-one and group instruction on information resources and provides more than 200 public terminals to access specialized indexes and web-based sources. Library holdings include more than 2 million books, bound journals and government documents. More than 20,000 journal subscriptions are available in the Journal Reading Room and over 500 subscription-based electronic resources are available either on-site or by remote access. The collections are enhanced by an expedited interlibrary loan service for delivery of materials from other libraries. University archives and special collections are housed in Morgan Library.

Capital Construction

CSU has received over \$72 million in state appropriated capital funds in the past five years, including over \$25 million in 1997-98.


International Programs

CSU administers 17 reciprocal exchange and one-way study abroad programs and is a member of the International Student Exchange Program which provides exchange opportunities with approximately 100 universities world-wide. In addition, CSU students study abroad through a variety of other programs offered by study abroad organizations and other universities. CSU is consistently one of the top-ranking universities in the nation for the recruitment of Peace Corps volunteers.

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
Facts about Students Fall 1999 Enrollment

There are 22,782 students from every state and 90 foreign countries. Colorado residents make up about 77 percent of the total enrollment and 11.2 percent of students with U.S. residency are ethnic minorities. There are 18,800 undergraduate, 3,452 graduate and 530 professional veterinary medicine students. The entering freshman class totals 3,137 students. On the average, entering freshmen rank in the 76th percentile of their graduating class, bring a 3.5 grade point average, and have an average ACT composite score of 24.2 or SAT combined score of 1,113.











Ten-Year History of Ethnic Enrollment







Top Countries of Residence for International Students




International Students by Region





Gender by Faculty Rank






Student-Faculty Ratio

The ratio of FTE students to tenure-track instructional faculty is 21 to 1. The ratio of headcount students to all faculty is 16 to 1.


Peer Comparison Average Faculty Salaries



Comparison of Faculty Salary







Undergraduate Technology Fees 1999-00 Academic Year




