Profile

Character

Colorado State University is a land-grant institution and a Carnegie Doctoral/Research University – Extensive. Colorado State University was founded in 1870 as the Colorado Agricultural College. The doors opened to the first students in 1879. In 1935, the school became the Colorado State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, or Colorado A&M, and was renamed Colorado State University in 1957.

Location

Fort Collins is a midsize city of approximately 120,000, located in northern Colorado at the western edge of the Great Plains and the base of the Rocky Mountains.

Campus

A 579-acre main campus (which includes 103 acres for the Veterinary Teaching Hospital), 1,715-acre foothills campus, 1,252acre agricultural campus, and 1,177-acre Pingree Park mountain campus are located in Larimer County. Colorado State University has 3,997 acres of land for research centers and Colorado State Forest Service stations outside of Larimer County.

Colleges

The colleges include: Agricultural Sciences, Applied Human Sciences, Business, Engineering, Liberal Arts, Natural Resources, Natural Sciences and Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences.

The Arts

CSU presents more than 300 performances, exhibits, and other art events each year, many of them free of charge. Facilities include the Hatton Gallery, the Curfman Gallery, the Music Recital Hall, the Lory Student Center Theatre, and the Johnson Hall Main Stage.



Profile

Athletics

CSU is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) at the Division I level and a founding member of the Mountain West Athletic Conference. The Rams field teams in 15 intercollegiate sports. Athletic facilities include Hughes Stadium and Moby Arena. Team colors are green and gold. CSU won the regular season championships in volleyball and women's basketball, won the Mountain West Conference indoor track-and-field title, and won a bowl game for the second year in a row.

University Budget

For FY2002, the total budget was \$547.3 million including an Education & General (E&G) budget of \$283.4 million. The E&G budget for FY2003 is \$302 million.

Alumni

CSU has more than 144,200 living alumni with 38 active alumni chapters (12 in Colorado and 26 out of state).

Outreach

Cooperative Extension has offices in 59 of 64 Colorado counties and delivers research-based information and educational programs to citizens locally. Colorado State Forest Service has 18 district offices statewide and provides information and programs on forest management, wildfire protection, community forestry, and conservation education. The Colorado Agricultural Experiment Station has 10 research centers that conduct site-specific research on agriculture and related issues important to the state's social and economic well-being. The Division of Educational Outreach offers a wide range of credit and noncredit educational opportunities available on campus, off campus, and by various distance education formats.



Profile

Residence Life

CSU has 10 residence halls with a capacity of about 4,500 students. There are 718 apartment units for students with families and 190 apartments for older or graduate students.

Student Life

CSU has 300 student organizations and 27 honor societies. About 60 percent of the undergraduate student population participates in intramural sports and 8 percent of undergraduates join one of the 21 fraternities and 15 sororities.

Academic Year

CSU operates on the semester system with the fall semester beginning in late August and ending before Christmas. The spring semester begins in January and ends in May. There are 12 weeks in the regular summer session.

Libraries

Library holdings include more than 2 million books, bound journals, and government documents. The library has 300 public terminals to access specialized indexes and web-based sources. Over 500 subscription-based electronic resources and 10,000 journal subscriptions are available on site or by remote access. An expedited interlibrary loan service for delivery of materials from other libraries is available and the circulation desk offers 60 laptop computers for checkout and use in the library.

Capital Construction

CSU has received more than \$151 million in state appropriated capital funds in the past seven years. An overall investment in facilities and major equipment of more than \$405 million has been made in the past 11 years.

International Programs

CSU has internationally-active faculty with a long history of involvement in international programs, including exchange, internships, and study abroad opportunities for students, project work, training, and relationships with partner institutions abroad. Over 1,100 foreign students and scholars are engaged in academic work on campus. CSU is consistently one of the topranking universities in the nation for the recruitment of Peace Corps volunteers.

University Honors Program


The University Honors Program is an innovative and enriched program of studies featuring small classes, an optional living and learning community in Newsom Residence Hall with abundant leadership, service and research opportunities.

Fall 2002 Enrollment

There are 24,735 students from 49 states and 90 foreign countries. Colorado residents make up about 78 percent of the total enrollment and 11.8 percent of students with U.S. residency are ethnic minorities. There are 20,568 undergraduate, 3,630 graduate, and 537 professional veterinary medicine students. The entering freshman class totals 3,829 students. On the average, entering freshmen rank in the 74th percentile of their graduating class, bring a 3.49 grade point average, and have an average ACT composite score of 24.2 or SAT combined score of 1,107.

Top Twenty Undergraduate Programs by Number of Majors



Top Twelve States of Residence for Nonresident Undergraduates







Ten-Year Class History













Student Level by College







Persistence of New Freshmen Ten-Year History








Faculty by Ethnicity

Faculty by Highest Degree Earned



Peer Comparison Average Faculty Salaries










Ten-Year Tuition and Fee History






