Colorado State University's land-grant mission is to forge links with people worldwide – through teaching, research, and service. In turn, these vital connections help stimulate cultural growth, economic development, and intellectual achievements for generations to come. We call it "Knowledge to Go Places."

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Profile

Character

Colorado State University is a land-grant institution and a Carnegie Doctoral/Research University – Extensive. Colorado State University was founded in 1870 as the Colorado Agricultural College. The doors opened to the first students in 1879. In 1935, the school became the Colorado State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, or Colorado A&M, and was renamed Colorado State University in 1957.

Location

Fort Collins is a midsize city of approximately 126,500, located in northern Colorado at the western edge of the Great Plains and the base of the Rocky Mountains.

Campus

A 579-acre main campus (which includes 101 acres for the Veterinary Teaching Hospital), 1,705-acre foothills campus, 1,434acre agricultural campus, and 1,177-acre Pingree Park mountain campus are located in Larimer County. Colorado State University has 3,994 acres of land for research centers and Colorado State Forest Service stations outside of Larimer County.

Colleges

The colleges include: Agricultural Sciences, Applied Human Sciences, Business, Engineering, Liberal Arts, Natural Sciences, Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, and the Warner College of Natural Resources.

The Arts

CSU presents more than 300 performances, exhibits, and other art events each year, many of them free of charge. Facilities include the Edna Rizley Griffin Concert Hall, University Theatre, Studio Theatre, William E. Runyan Music Hall, Hatton Gallery, Curfman Gallery, and the Lory Student Center Theatre.



Profile

Athletics

CSU is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) at the Division I level and a founding member of the Mountain West Athletic Conference. The Rams field teams in 16 intercollegiate sports. Athletic facilities include Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium and Moby Arena. Team colors are green and gold. CSU won the Mountain West Conference championship in volleyball the past two years.

University Budget

For FY2006, the total budget is \$651.5 million including an Education & General (E&G) budget of \$313.6 million.

Alumni

CSU has 154,375 living alumni with 50 active alumni chapters (10 in Colorado and 40 out of state).

Outreach

Cooperative Extension has offices in 59 of 64 Colorado counties and delivers research-based information and educational programs to citizens locally. Colorado State Forest Service has 17 district offices statewide and provides information and programs on forest management, wildfire protection, community forestry, and conservation education. The Colorado Agricultural Experiment Station has 8 research centers that conduct site-specific research on agriculture and related issues important to the state's social and economic well-being. Continuing Education offers a wide range of credit and noncredit educational opportunities available on campus, off campus, and by various distance education formats.



Profile

Residence Life

CSU has 10 residence halls with a capacity of about 4,800 students. There are 718 apartment units for students with families and 190 apartments for older or graduate students.

Student Life

CSU has 300 student organizations and 27 honor societies. About 60 percent of the undergraduate student population participates in intramural sports and 8 percent of undergraduates join one of the 21 fraternities and 15 sororities.

Academic Year

CSU operates on the semester system with the fall semester beginning in late August and ending before Christmas. The spring semester begins in January and ends in May. There are 12 weeks in the regular summer session.

Libraries

Library holdings include more than 2 million books, bound journals, and government documents. The library has 300 public terminals to access specialized indexes and web-based sources. About 8,100 journal subscriptions and about 15,100 subscription-based and nonsubscription electronic resources are available on site or by remote access. An expedited interlibrary loan service including desktop delivery of materials from other libraries is available and the circulation desk offers laptop computers for checkout and use in the library.

Capital Construction/Major Equipment

The total investment from all fund sources over the past 14 years is approximately \$573 million.

International Programs

CSU has internationally-active faculty with a distinguished history of involvement in international programs. Over 1,200 foreign students and scholars are engaged in academic work and research on campus. CSU is consistently one of the top-ranking universities in the nation for the recruitment of Peace Corps volunteers. More than 500 students study abroad in more than 30 countries each year.

University Honors Program

The University Honors Program is an innovative and enriched program of studies featuring small classes, an optional living and learning community in Newsom Residence Hall with abundant leadership, service and research opportunities.

Fall 2005 Enrollment

There are 24,947 students from every state and 85 foreign countries. Colorado residents make up about 80 percent of the total enrollment and 12.2 percent of students with U.S. residency are ethnic minorities. There are 20,720 undergraduate, 3,690 graduate, and 537 professional veterinary medicine students. The entering freshman class totals 3,893 students. On the average, entering freshmen rank in the 71st percentile of their graduating class, bring a 3.5 grade point average, and have an average ACT composite score of 24.0 or SAT combined score of 1,118.






Undergraduates by Class and Residency






CSU's Professional Veterinary Medicine Program is ranked second in the nation by U.S. News and World Report and is ranked first in the country in federal research dollars.





Persistence of New Freshmen Ten-Year History












