### Profile

#### Character

Colorado State University is a land-grant institution and a Carnegie Doctoral/Research University – Extensive. Colorado State University was founded in 1870 as the Colorado Agricultural College. The doors opened to the first students in 1879. In 1935, the school became the Colorado State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, or Colorado A&M, and was renamed Colorado State University in 1957.

### Location

Fort Collins is a midsize city of approximately 134,000, located in northern Colorado at the western edge of the Great Plains and the base of the Rocky Mountains. *Money Magazine* ranked Fort Collins as the "Best Place to Live" in America for 2006.

#### Campus

A 579-acre main campus (which includes 101 acres for the Veterinary Teaching Hospital), 1,705-acre foothills campus, 1,434-acre agricultural campus, and 1,177-acre Pingree Park mountain campus are located in Larimer County. Colorado State University has 3,994 acres of land for research centers and Colorado State Forest Service stations outside of Larimer County.

### The Arts

CSU presents more than 300 performances, exhibits, and other art events each year, many of them free of charge. Facilities include the Edna Rizley Griffin Concert Hall, University Theatre, Studio Theatre, William E. Runyan Music Hall, Hatton Gallery, Curfman Gallery, and the Lory Student Center Theatre.

### Alumni

CSU has 159,335 living alumni with 50 active alumni chapters (10 in Colorado and 40 out of state).

### Colleges

The colleges include: Agricultural Sciences, Applied Human Sciences, Business, Engineering, Liberal Arts, Natural Sciences, Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, and the Warner College of Natural Resources.

#### Athletics

CSU is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) at the Division I level and a founding member of the Mountain West Athletic Conference. The Rams field teams in 16 intercollegiate sports. Athletic facilities include Sonny Lubick Field at Hughes Stadium and Moby Arena. Team colors are green and gold. The Colorado State volleyball team won the Mountain West Conference regular season five of the past nine years.

### **University Budget**

For FY2007, the total budget is \$684.8 million including an Education & General (E&G) budget of \$328.8 million.

#### Outreach

Cooperative Extension has offices in 59 of 64 Colorado counties and delivers research-based information and educational programs to citizens locally. Colorado State Forest Service has 17 district offices statewide and provides information and programs on forest management, wildfire protection, community forestry, and conservation education. The Colorado Agricultural Experiment Station has 8 research centers and 10 different sites that conduct sitespecific research on agriculture and related issues important to the state's social and economic well-being. Continuing Education offers a wide range of credit and noncredit educational opportunities available on campus, off campus, and by various distance education formats.



### Profile

### **Residence Life**

CSU has 10 residence halls with a capacity of about 4,800 students. There are 718 apartment units for students with families and 190 apartments for older or graduate students.

### Student Life

CSU has 300 student organizations and 20 honor societies. About 80 percent of the undergraduate student population participates in intramural sports and 8 percent of undergraduates join one of the 22 fraternities and 14 sororities.

### Academic Year

CSU operates on the semester system with the fall semester beginning in late August and ending before Christmas. The spring semester begins in January and ends in May. There are 12 weeks in the regular summer session.

#### Libraries

Library holdings include more than 2 million books, bound journals, and government documents. The library has 300 public terminals to access specialized indexes and web-based sources. More than 30,000 electronic resources including e-journals can be accessed through the Web at http://lib. colostate.edu. An expedited interlibrary loan service including desktop delivery of materials from other libraries is available and the circulation desk offers laptop computers for checkout and use in the library.

### **Capital Construction/Major Equipment**

The total investment from all fund sources over the past 15 years is approximately \$612 million.

### International Programs

CSU has internationally-active faculty with a distinguished history of involvement in international programs. Over 1,200 foreign students and scholars are engaged in academic work and research on campus. CSU is consistently one of the top-ranking universities in the nation for the recruitment of Peace Corps volunteers. Approximately 600 students per year participate in educational programs abroad.

### **University Honors Program**

The University Honors Program has approximately 1,000 program participants annually and offers a unique opportunity to live in the Honors Living Learning Community.

#### Fall 2006 Enrollment

There are 24,670 students from every state and 86 foreign countries. Colorado residents make up about 80 percent of the total enrollment and 12.6 percent of students with U.S. residency are ethnic minorities. There are 20,500 undergraduate, 3,636 graduate, and 534 professional veterinary medicine students. The entering freshman class totals 4,093 students. On the average, entering freshmen rank in the 72<sup>nd</sup> percentile of their graduating class, bring a 3.5 grade point average, and have an average ACT composite score of 24.0 or SAT combined score of 1,112.





### **Undergraduates by Class and Residency**





















### Comparison of Peer Institutions Undergraduate Tuition – 2006-2007


